SAFETY HINTS FOR CHRISTMAS

1. Christmas Trees: Keep tree away from open fires and heaters! Keep tree in water or wet sand from the time it is brought into the house. Make fresh cuts on trunk to allow tree to absorb water. Remove tree from house just as soon as holidays are over! **DRY TREES ARE A FIRE HAZARD!**
2. Tree Lights: Don't use lights whose cord is wrapped around sockets or broken or loose! Don't attach too many lights to the same outlet and thereby overload the electric circuit! A blown fuse is a sign of overloading the electric circuit! NEVER PLACE A PENNY IN THE FUSE! NEVER USE CANDLES ON OR NEAR YOUR TREE!
3. Tree Decorations: Make sure that "flickies," snows, tinsel, and other tree decorations will not burn!
4. Gift Wrappings: Keep paper, especially tissue wrapping, away from fire! Keep a waste basket handy to put gift wrappings in!

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F.F.A. boys visit tree nursery

William Moore's vocational agriculture classes on Wednesday of last week visited Gar Woodland's T. W. Earle Forest tree nursery north of Statesboro.

Mr. Walter Stone, nurseryman for Gar Woodlands, Inc. explained the operation of the nursery to the boys.

He pointed out that pine seed from various areas were planted in separate beds so that the pine seedlings grown at the nursery could be returned to the same general area from which the seed were collected. It has been found that pine seedlings make their best growth when planted in the same geographic area from which the seed were collected.

Mr. Stone explained some of the work involved in keeping the young pine healthy. Sprays must be applied and constant vigilance must be maintained to protect the young seedlings from insects and diseases.

The boys learned that about nine months are required to grow seedlings ready for transplanting. They saw seedlings being lifted from beds down last March.

After the seedlings are lifted they are taken to a grading room where deformed, small and diseased seedlings are culled. Mr. Stone explained that a high percentage of the seedlings were in excellent condition and that only a few were being culled.

After removing the culs, the seedlings are bundled in groups of 100, covered with damp sphagnum moss and sent for delivery to the field. Mr. Stone stated that there is only a four-day lapse from the time the seedlings are pulled from the nursery until they are transplanted in field.

He will be escorted into town from the local airport by motorcycle police. A platform will be ready for him so that all the children of this section may meet him in person.

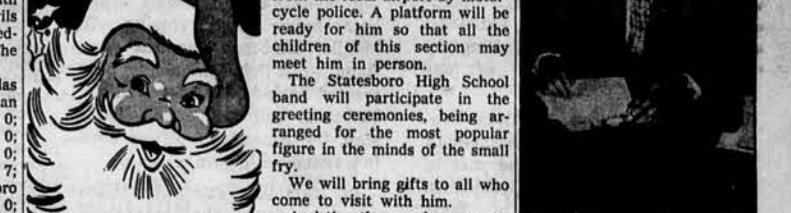
The Statesboro High School band will participate in the greeting ceremonies, being arranged for the most popular figure in the minds of the small fry.

A \$25,000 trip saves millions for U. S. taxpayers

A trip around the globe which cost less than \$25,000 is now saving the tax payers of the United States millions of dollars each year.

Back in 1953 our own Congressman, Prince H. Preston, together with Representatives Frank T. Bow of Ohio, and Sam Coon of Oregon, began a trip on which they were to discover evidence to substantiate reports of costly fumbles in our State Department's purchase of properties for the use of our diplomats in foreign countries in all corners of the world.

In their November issue the publishers of Reader's Digest condensed the account of the trip made by our three representatives as reported in the National Review.

What Representatives Preston, Bow and Coon turned up blew the lid on a condition which was costing our nation millions of dollars a year, and focused attention on the activities of the State Department's Foreign Buildings Operation Bureau which is entrusted with the business of handling the real-estate operations of our government.

All over Europe the three Congressmen turned up instances of stupid judgement on the part of the Foreign Building Operations.

In Bonn, capital of West Germany, Congressman Preston and his fellow-Congressmen, discovered the biggest non-military housing development every undertaken by the U. S. Government abroad: 458 furnished apartments costing \$31,448 each; five senior diplomats' homes for \$184,310 each, and an ambassador's residence for \$239,964; a church, two schools, a shopping center, a theatre and a recreation area complete with swimming pool.

This project, including two bachelor-apartment buildings that were the tallest structures in the entire Rhine area except for church spires, was the most prominent landmark in Bonn. Setting Americans off from local people, it created envy and ridicule.

You naturally wonder how had such extravagant purchasing and building programs come about? At the end of the war, through settlements under lend-lease and sales of war assets and surplus properties, we found ourselves with some 900 million dollars in various foreign credits which could not be readily converted into dollars but could be spent abroad in local currencies. The availability of all this buying power created the illusion that anything it bought was "free." F.B.O. purchasing agents treated it as if it would buy nothing but real estate, with the result that some 97 per cent of our acquisitions were made with these credits.

In Nice our three representatives learned that the United States owned a beautiful villa with lovely gardens overlooking the Riviera. Full time workmen tended the place, but for several years no one had lived there because the consul general preferred his more convenient establishment nearer the city.

The Editor's Uneasy Chair

WE CANNOT agree with our neighboring columnist, Max Lockwood in his last week's plea that the peoples of Bulloch County and the United States urge our leaders to implement the abandonment of the United Nations.

Our only hope for future world peace is that we have an organization like the United Nations into which all nations, large and small, may bring their problems. We concede that there may be weaknesses in the United Nations but at times it seems ineffectual.

When Congressman Preston, Bow and Coon returned to Washington the fur flew. The State Department and F.B.O. officials had appeared before the Appropriations Committee and blandly asked for twelve million dollars to continue their building and maintenance program abroad.

And because these three were intent upon saving money for the taxpayers the State Department cut its twelve million dollar request in half and began to reorganize its foreign-building program toward adequate quarters, in keeping with prestige requirements, rather than places with high maintenance costs.

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The nation owes Congressman Preston, Bow and Coon a rousing vote of thanks. It was a rough trip. It was not a pleasure trip. It meant constant and penetrating questioning to get at the real facts. It meant sifting the information given them to separate the truth from the fiction.

And the nation owes the National Review and Readers Digest a vote of appreciation for throwing the spotlight on the findings of these three representatives of the people.

LAST WEEK my good friend, Max Lockwood wrote urging those who love America to drive from her shores, the United Nations.

I disagree with Max. I feel that we as Americans ought to take some stock of ourselves.

First, I would like to ask, "Which one of us born in America had anything to do with our birthplace?" Except by the grace of God, anyone of us might have been born a yellow man in China, a black man in Africa, a Communist in Russia, an Eskimo of the most northern and the most southern parts of the world. But because of the great gift of God we were born in the richest country of the world. We ought to be very humble about this.
