Where Will You Be March 6?

Judge J. L. Renfree in his charge to the January term grand jury, casually asked that venerable group, representing Bulloch county, "Where were you on last election day?"

The judge then produced figures to show that he knew where 2,830 of our citizens were, at one time during the day—they were at the polls. He knew that 10,436 persons were not at the polls.

Now we ask—where will you be on March 6—election day?

Sure we know. That's too far ahead to say where you'll be. You may have to make a trip to Atlanta, to Savannah, or to the farm, or you just may be too busy to vote.

Where will you be March 6?

Recently a licensed liquor dealer was caught for selling whiskey on Sunday.

It is known that other dealers are selling liquor on Sunday, on election days, and after the legal hours set by law.

The state law says liquor may be sold between the hours of 8 a. m. and 11 p. m. on election days.

The dealers in Statesboro observe the city law.

If the other dealers who fail to observe the laws governing their sales continue ignoring these laws they are going to suddenly find the sentiment of the people in Bulloch county so against them that the county will be "dry" quick.

And there is a responsibility on the people of Bulloch county. Since the people did vote "wet" it is their responsibility to see that the laws governing the "wet" condition of the county are observed to the letter.

Let your attitude be so positive that dealers in the county will react in favor of the law.

The alternative will be—the county will vote "dry" and the bootleggers will give three rousing cheers.

More Cheers

A hearty welcome to the Bulloch Herald and its editors, the Coleman brothers, who return to the newspaper field in Statesboro this week.

Some three years ago when it looked like this country was in for a long, hard scrap, Leodel, Jim and G. C. Coleman put their heads together and decide that helping to win that war was more important than running a business.

So, the machines were oiled and greased, the typewriters covered, and a sign nailed on the door stating that the Coleman brothers had gone to war.

They said they would be back. They said the Herald would resume publication right where it left off.

Hold That Ceiling

Here is what happens when price controls are snipped too soon:

This happened to a candy manufacturer. Two days after ceilings were removed from cocoas, the manufacturer was offered \$150 a thousand for a boatload of cocoas for which he had paid the OPA price of \$61.50 per thousand.

Two days later the price had jumped to \$250 for a thousand cocoas which would have cost just \$15 before the war.

Because of that unrestrained jump in production costs, the manufacturer is now seeking permission from the OPA to raise his candy prices.

That is one example of what happens and who is expected to pay for what happens—YOU.

The new train will make only three stops and will reduce the running time about two hours.

We learned, unofficially, that Dover will not be one of the stops.

For scores of years the people of Statesboro and Bulloch and Savannah and Screven have been going to Dover to catch the Central of Georgia to Atlanta and back.

At first we rode the local from Statesboro to Dover. Some drove horse and buggy. Then came the automobile.

A lot of people from Statesboro and Savannah make that trip to Atlanta.

Are we going to have to drive to Millen to catch the Central's train?

Now, before the schedule becomes final, is the time for the people of Bulloch and Screven to be concerned about this.

Let's get together and make sure that the Streamliner stops at Dover.

As far as the Central is concerned, Dover is just the station for Statesboro Traffic. And can't we offer more than Statesboro? We think not!

Pick Flowers from This List for Peace Garden

Garden planning is best done in the winter when the gardener has most time for it. Here is a list of flowers, classified according to type, color and habits, which may be a valuable aid in planning a garden on paper.

For edges and borders—Sweet alyssum, dwarf nasturtiums, lobelia, dwarf marigold, ageratum, Phlox stocks, forget-me-nots. Long stems for cutting—Asters, calliopsis, morning glories or scabiosa, cosmos, giant zinnias, and double galliardias.

Short stems for cutting—Marigolds, snapdragons, calendulas, sweet peas, annual chrysanthemums, bachelor buttons, gladioli, lilliput zinnias, annual pink, and purple salpiglossias.

For color masses—Petunias, zinnias, marigolds, calendulas, annual Statice, stock, aster, salvia and poppies.

For light or poor soil—Nasturtiums, Clarkia, godetia, poppy, portulaca and annuus.

For shade—Mignonette, heliotrope, zinnias, alyssum, ten weeks' stock and sweet pea.

For blue—Delphinium, cornflower, iris or wishbone plant, godetia, forget-me-not, nemophila and varieties of mimulus.

For hot situations—Sunflowers, sweet peas, portulaca, ice plant, portulaca, and annual chrysanthemums.

Vines—Morning glories, moonflower, Japanese hop, climbing nasturtium, cardinal climber, clematis, cypress vine, balloon vine, scarlet runner and hyacinth beans.

Prisoners. Plans are practically complete for more than doubling the capacity of the county hospital. Our health department is getting back on before-the-war basis and, joining in the Federal Government and other local units of government, we have just begun a county-wide program of Bril's fever and malaria control, spraying all homes in the county this year with DDT. The State Highway Department has just informed us of the re-opening of all Burton's Ferry road contracts from Statesboro to Sylvania, and an early letting of ten miles of paving from the Teachers College to Denmark on State Route 67 to Pembroke. Surveys and plans for post roads in the county are nearing completion and we expect soon to see contracts let for completion of grading and paving of several of these roads.

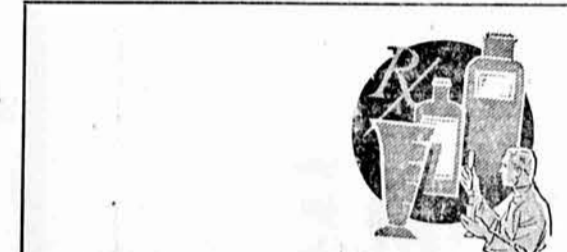

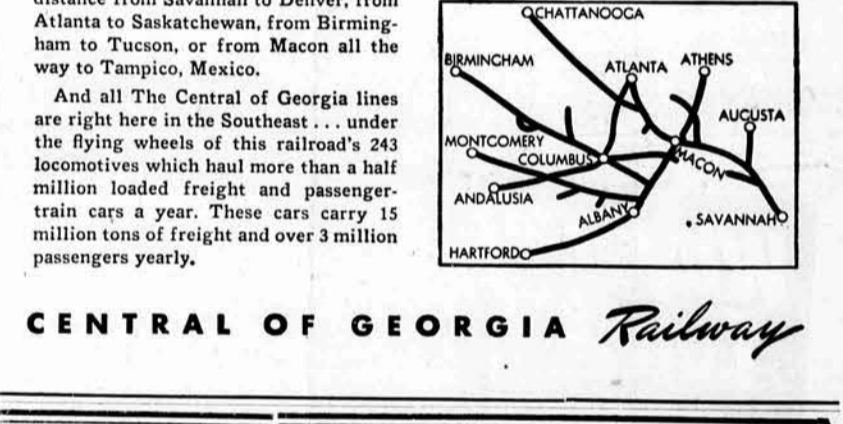
