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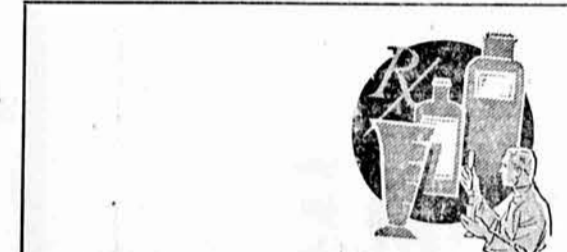

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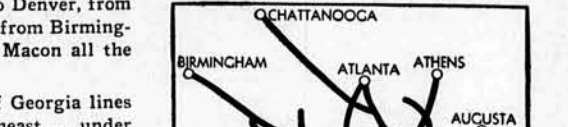

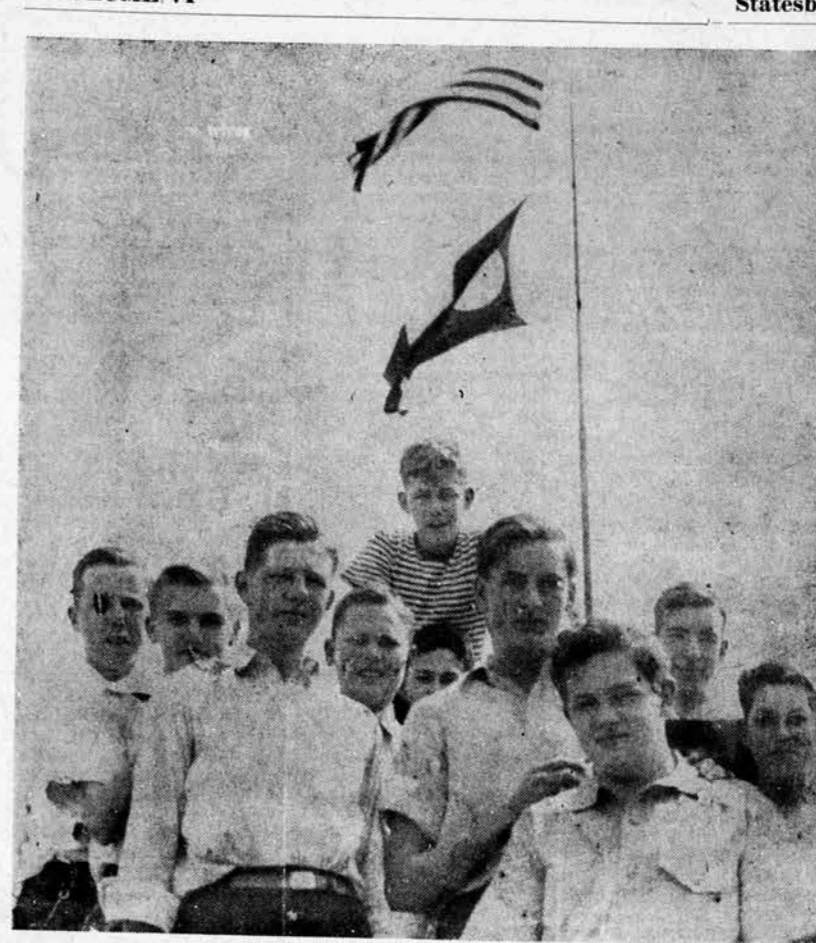

World War II Flings 10 Pals To All Parts of The Globe

In the spring of 1941 ten Statesboro High School boys set their sights on a career in the armed forces, with not a care in the world. At the moment they were concerned only with having their picture made to go in the Criterion, the high school year book. When the picture was made they had no way of knowing that in 1946, oceans would separate some of them, that continents would separate others. They had no way of knowing that one would be an observer of an experiment, unlike any that the world had ever known—the test explosion of an atomic bomb in the Pacific ocean. They had no way of knowing that one would be in Tokyo, Japan; another would be in Germany; another would be in the high seas on his way to LaHavre, France. They had no way of knowing that one of their group would die the death of a fighting man for the ideals which this great nation stands. The picture was made. It was used in the Criterion. Then came December 7, 1941 and the fireworks. One by one Uncle Sam drafted boys. And the reason there were no places for these two was no fault of theirs for they, too, wanted to serve their country. JOHN DARLEY KILLED WITH ASSAULT MARINES John Darley, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Darley, was the one of that group that was to give his life for his country. And it was at Iwo Jima on the day the U. S. Marines landed on that tiny volcanic spot in the Pacific ocean that God saw fit to blow heaven for young John, and the Marines were later to blow tops over his grave. John had made the assault at Normandy in Europe on June 6, 1944, as a member of the U. S. Marine Corps as a hospital corpsman and in December 1944 he showed off for the Pacific. February 18 the Marines hit Iwo Jima. John was in the second wave of assault Marines—going in full—he was wounded in the first few moments of the assault, but he refused to be evacuated. Three hours later he was with a group of five corpsmen working with wounded Marines when a shell hit in the group. Three were wounded, he was unhurt and John was killed. It's good that John didn't know what was in store for him when his picture was made that day for the Criterion. PARRISH BLITCH STILL IN JAPAN WITH AIR FORCE Parrish Blitch, tall and willowy, now is a navigator in the Army Air Force and is at a base near Tokyo, Japan. He entered the air forces and received his navigator wings at Monroe, Louisiana on January 27, 1945. Since April, 1945 he has been in the Pacific, seeing action on New Guinea and later over Japan, flying troop carrier planes. Red Cross Drive To Get Under Way March 12. The Georgia Hereford Association sold 55 Hereford cattle here Tuesday for \$13,590, including 44 purebred polled and horned bulls for \$11,115, and 11 females for \$2,475. Three sold for \$300 to \$400; six sold for \$200 to \$300; and three sold for \$100 to \$200. Mr. J. H. Hughes, secretary-treasurer of the association, sold 11 bulls at the sale and said he was pleased with the average prices his cattle brought. He stated that the people of this section were more careful in their bidding for the bulls offered than in other sections of the state where sales had been held.
