Visiting Teacher Explains Her Work

By Maud White

The work of a visiting teacher was new in Bulloch county. It seemed that there was no material available that would give any workable information that could be followed.

The first thing we did was to distribute the school census cards in each school, in order that we could get an enrollment of all the children in each school of the county, and to get a list of those that did not have a census card, and also get a list of the children according to the census cards, that were not enrolled in their respective schools.

The plan of procedure decided on by the Bulloch County Board of Education, County School Superintendent and Visiting Teachers, was to take the list of pupils marked "Not enrolled" and mail a letter to the parents of such children, stating that part of the Compulsory School Attendance Law that concerns them directly, and also a list of the children who were not enrolled in their respective schools. We did this hoping these people would recognize their mistakes and accept the responsibility of keeping their children in school without coercion on the part of outsiders.

After these letters have been mailed for a period of four or five days, the Visiting Teachers visit the school and check with the teacher to see if the proper response by entering their children. If the children re-

Farm Briefs

FARM DEMAND

The demand for farm products seems likely to be maintained at about its present high level during most of 1946, although the pressure of export demand on available supplies may be lessened late in the year, the Georgia Agricultural Extension Service reports.

The reconversion of industry to a peacetime basis is proceeding rapidly and the accumulated purchasing power in the hands of consumers is large, a high level of non-agricultural employment and output is likely to be maintained in 1946.

LIVESTOCK AND MEATS

Meat prices declined less than seasonally during the fall and early winter. Prices received by farmers for cattle averaged the highest on record for the season. Hog prices declined only slightly from ceilings in early January as marketings of the 1945 spring-crop hogs approached the peak. Meat output in 1946 is likely to be somewhat greater than in 1945 and perhaps 40 percent above the average of 1935-40 crop.

POULTRY AND EGGS

Civilian demand for eggs in 1946 is expected to remain strong although it will be weaker than in 1945 when incomes were at a record level and supplies of red eggs were short. Kenneth Treanor, economist of the Extension Service, predicts. Farm egg production in 1946 probably will be about the same as in 1945 and an excess of supply over demand at support home at develop during the flush production season.

Through the years Georgia 4-H Club members have won many national honors because of their outstanding records. This year the state won eight national honors for human happiness and for the future of this county and our state and nation as the solution of any of our great health problems.

Home Demonstration News This Week

HOME AGENT URGES WOMEN TO STRESS SOCIAL HYGIENE

Urging Bulloch County home demonstration club members and other rural women to stress social hygiene and social hygiene problems at their club meetings during the month of March, Miss Irma Spears, home demonstration agent this week pointed out that "eradication of social diseases" will do as much for the family for human happiness and for the future of this county and our state and nation as the solution of any of our great health problems.

- 1 teaspoon salt
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 1 tablespoon sugar
 - 1-2 teaspoon salt
 - 1-2 teaspoon mustard
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 1-4 cup sweet milk
 - 1 cup vinegar
- Mix the dry ingredients in the upper part of double boiler. Add the milk slowly to dry ingredients and place over boiling water in bottom part of double boiler. Stir constantly to prevent lumping. Next add wet beaten eggs. Cook until the consistency of thick cream. Add butter and vinegar and let cool. This dressing may be used with vegetables or meat salads.
- Sour Cream Salad Dressing
- 1-4 teaspoon mustard
 - 1-2 teaspoon salt
 - 1-4 teaspoon paprika
 - 1-2 tablespoon sugar
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 cup sour cream
- Beat the eggs until very light, add the other ingredients, and cook in double boiler, stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from the fire and beat well. If this dressing is cooked properly it will have when cool a thick, smooth consistency. If it is overdone so that there is a tendency to separate, it should be strained before cooling.

AGENT GIVES TIPS ON TRANSPLANTING OF NATIVE PLANTS

Native plants may be transplanted from the woods to save money in home landscape projects County Agent Byron Dyer declared.

"Many native trees and shrubs found in Bulloch county are just as good for use in landscaping home grounds as purchased plants," the agent said.

"When transplanting native plants, it is much better to select the plants for transplanting from the woods than from a nursery. The plants are pointed out. 'Trees one inch in diameter at the base are large enough. The smaller plants are easier to dig since the roots are small, and the plants may be set in new location easily. The large tree sustains a severe shock in transplanting and fails to recover or makes slow growth.'

"Some trees and shrubs are easily moved, the county agent said, but generally, the plant should be dug carefully, taking care to retain as many feeding roots as possible and to keep the woods soil around the roots. It is a good plan to wrap moist burlap around the roots from the soil and protect the roots from drying. Never expose the roots to sun or drying winds.

"Plants should be set in new locations at about the same depth as they grew naturally," the agent advised. "Dig the hole deeper than the plant requires so that rich soil or compost can be put in to the bottom, leaving room enough so the roots will not be crowded or bent.

"Tramp the mixture of soil and manure around the roots so that firm before setting the plant," he

continued. "Be sure the soil gets between the roots and it is firm. A compact soil holds the moisture within itself and so protects the root. Loose soils dry quickly and allow the roots to dry out too rapidly."

The soil is usually moist enough during the winter so that the plants will not need to be watered, he Extension Service agent explained. If the soil tends to dry, leaves or straw. When the plant begins to grow a small amount of commercial fertilizer may be applied.

"Always consider the natural environment of the plant and strive to duplicate it as nearly as possible," Mr. Dyer recommended.

Remember that some plants will do better in a shady location than in sunlight.

Further information on transplanting native plants for use in home landscaping and other information may be secured from county agricultural or home demonstration agent's office or by writing the Extension Service in Athens.

TREAT COTTON SEED FOR HIGH YIELDS, FARM AGENT URGES

Urging Bulloch County Farmers to treat their cotton seed before planting season, Byron Dyer, county agricultural agent, this week pointed out that the rainy weather which prevailed during the cotton picking season caused the cotton seed to become loaded with seed-borne diseases.

"Unless cotton seed is treated with Ceresan or some equally effective material to kill these seed-borne diseases, stands will be poor next spring and the average yields will be down considerably," Mr. Dyer pointed out.

Stressing the value of treating cotton seed, the county agent reported that seed treatment increases yields and brings increased returns estimated at slightly more than \$6,500,000 to the State's one-variety growers alone during 1945.

"When cotton seed is not treated, seed-borne diseases attack and kill the seed as they begin to sprout," Mr. Dyer explained. "Germination tests made of several lots of seed from the 1945 crop showed 80 percent germination for untreated seed and germination of treated seed and germination of cotton seed from the same lot was 80 percent or higher when seed was delinted with produce almost as
