
Some trees and shrubs are easily moved, the county agent said, but generally, the plant should be dug carefully, taking care to retain as many feeding roots as possible and to keep the woods soil around the roots. It is a good plan to wrap moist burlap around the roots as the soil and protect the roots from drying. Never exposee the roots to sun or drying winds. "Plants should be set in new locations at about the same depth as they grew naturally," the farm agent advised. "Dig the hole deep-er than the plant requires so that rich soil or compost can be put in-to the bottom, leaving room
