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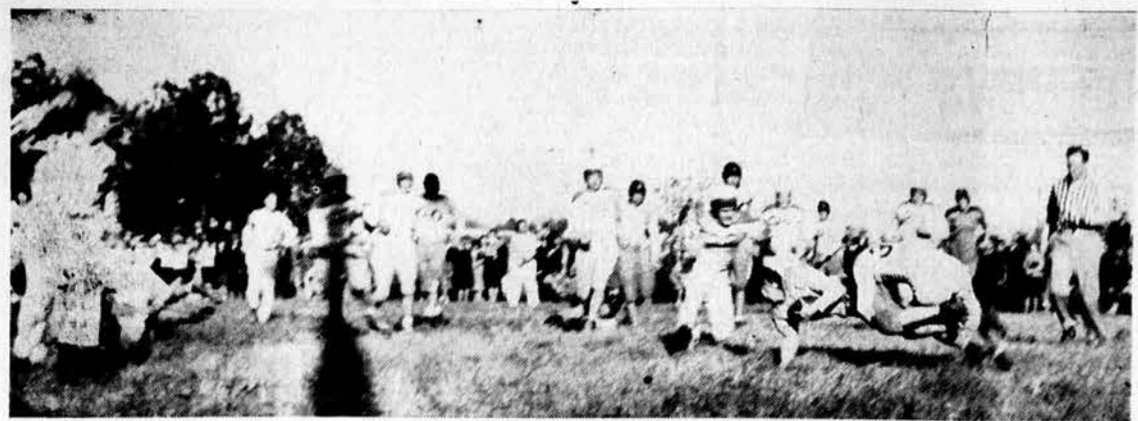

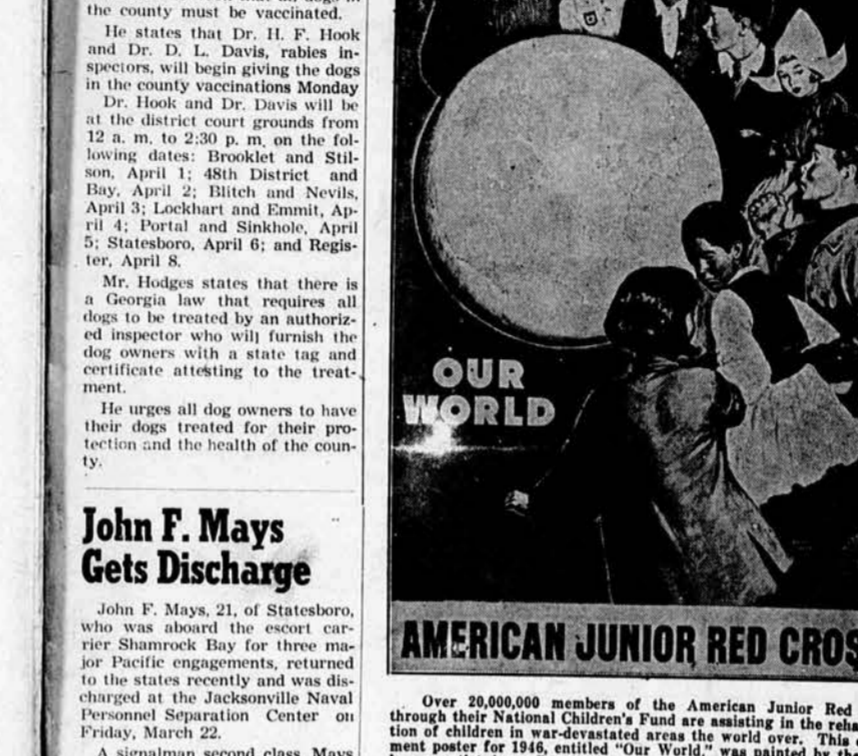

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Building Curb Not To Stop Warehouse

The Government curb on virtually all new construction to conserve building materials for veteran's housing announced Wednesday by the Civilian Production Administration will not, in the opinion of Aubert J. Brannen, hamper the construction of the new Sheppard and Brannen tobacco warehouse.

Mr. Brannen states that most of the materials and lumber have been cleared for the site and the leveling of the ground on Zetterover Ave. It is expected that early next week work will begin on laying the floor which will be all hard surfaces.

Mr. Brannen states that the warehouse will be ready to receive tobacco for the 1946 season, and it will be one of the largest warehouses in Statesboro and in this section of the country. More than 100 men will be given employment in the operation of the warehouse during the tobacco season.

When this year's crop is complete there will be a total of seven warehouses in Statesboro and will include Statesboro with the larger markets in the state.

Statesboro Presbyterians Honor The Late Dr. James B. Woods

DR. JAMES B. WOODS (1867-1945) The First Presbyterian Church of Statesboro Georgia wishes to set forth the following, in loving memory of Dr. James B. Woods; Dr. Woods with Mrs. Woods came to Statesboro to make their home in the fall of 1942, after a service of 48 years as medical missionary in China.

His quiet, modest manner only enhanced his truly Christian character. He did not rest from his labors while among us — giving freely of his time and talents. He joyfully taught us in our Sunday School and from the pulpit when called upon.

We account it God's blessing that he dwelt among us. —Fielding D. Russell, Clerk of Session. citizens of Statesboro and Bulloch county. He was a brilliant student and a profound scholar; a pioneer medical missionary who developed a great hospital and medical work in China.

education at Pantops Academy. In 1887 he received his Master of Arts degree at the University of Virginia and in 1890 he graduated with his M. D. For three years after he graduated in medicine, Dr. Woods was associated with the New York City Hospital, then known as Charity Hospital, first as an intern, later resident and finally as staff surgeon.

In 1894 Dr. Woods sailed for China with his bride, Bessie Smith daughter of Dr. James P. Smith, a member of Stonewall Jackson's staff. With practically no equipment he laid the groundwork and later developed a hospital and medical work at Tsing-Kiang-Pu which in time became the largest Presbyterian mission hospital in China.

Essentially retiring and modest, little was known of Dr. Woods and his work in America because he never publicized his work. The city authorities where he worked agreed with him that no one should be arrested for any crime while at the hospital or while going to or from the hospital. All who went to the hospital were treated and cared for, the poor and the rich.

A medical journal, studying the work of clinics and numbers of patients, declared that the clinic of Dr. Woods' hospital was the largest in the world. Dr. Woods made a deep impression on the Chinese while working with them. He numbered among his closest friends Chinese scholars and officials. Because he was the youngest of four brothers, three of whom went to China as missionaries, he was affectionately known far and wide as "Mr. Four."

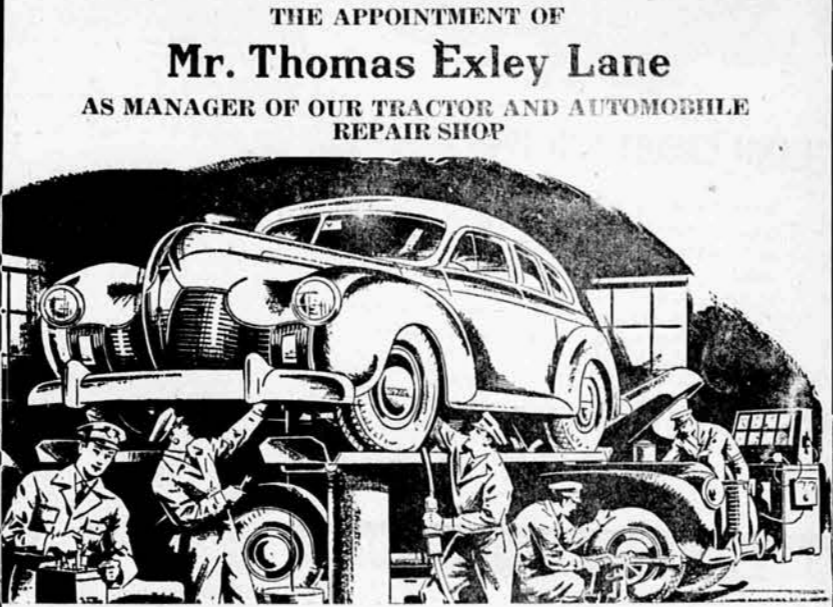

BEST 1-VARIETY COTTON COUNTY TO GET AWARD A trophy will be awarded to the Georgia county that makes the most outstanding accomplishments in the one-variety cotton program during 1946. E. C. Westbrook, cotton specialist of the Agricultural Extension Service, announced this week.

Selection of the winning one-variety county will be based on the 1946 results, and consideration will be given to such factors as use of only one variety of cotton, seed treatment, better cultural methods (fertilization, boll weevil control, good ginning, and general use of soil conservation practices, he continued.

The recognition trophy is awarded by a large organization of cotton merchants (The Atlantic Cotton Association) in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Service, U. S. Bureau of Plant Industry, Coastal Plain Experiment Station and Georgia Experiment Station.

This year marks the fourth time the trophy will be awarded, according to Mr. Westbrook. Walton county one-variety farmers won the first trophy for county-wide performance in 1941, followed by Coweta farmers in 1942. In 1944, year of the last award, Fayette cotton growers captured the trophy.

CONCERNING SOYBEANS LAND FOR CORN Soybeans are used mainly for hay in Georgia. Practically all seed reduced aroused for planting. Some soybeans are now being grown for grazing and a limited amount for oil and table use. In preparing land for corn, the soil should be thoroughly broken to a depth of six to eight inches or deeper depending upon the depth of the soil, explains E. D. Alexander, agronomist for the Agricultural Extension Service.
