Examiner Ross I. Newman, who conducted the southeastern case earings held at Greensboro, N. C. in May and June 1945, recommend-ed that certificate for five routes be given to Southern Airways which would enable this company to offer, mail, passenger and ex-press service to a total of 61 cit-
