MECHANICAL COTTON PICKER DEMONSTRATES ON FARM NEAR MIDDLEVILLE

A mechanical cotton picker was demonstrated on H. C. Alexander's farm, about five miles north of Middleville Tuesday, September 10, at 10 a.m.

Several Bulloch county farmers visited this farm some six weeks ago to see several new machines that Mr. Alexander is using, including the cotton picker and three flume cultivators. Others had said they wanted to see the picker work.

One economical practice used on this farm that local cotton growers might use in many fields is the cross cultivating to chop the cotton. This practice saved lots of hand labor in chopping the 1946 crop for Mr. Alexander. He also used a defoliation material to help control the boll weevil.

LEGISLATIVE CHANGES

a. Adopt Council-Manager form of City Government.

b. Adopt new City Charter as recommended by National Municipal League.

c. Change City Election day from first Saturday in December to first Tuesday in December.

d. Change Registration Law to allow city registration books to remain open eleven months in year, closing one month prior to election.

e. Divide city into four wards, elect one councilman from each ward and two at large, a total of six councilmen.

f. Float bond issue sufficient to: (1) Get City out of current debt; (2) Begin extensive paving program; (3) Provide for sewage and water main extensions; (4) Make additions to school system; and (5) Erect Municipal play ground, swimming pool, and a new stadium.

g. Publish minutes of all City Council meetings in both local newspapers, in order to familiarize public with problems of the City.

h. Appoint a Recorder to act as Police Court Judge.

i. Create a department to beautify our City by planting trees, flowers, shrubbery, etc. on streets and in parks.

j. Pass a Zoning Law, creating business, industrial, and residential property, so that citizens who buy property will know what they may build there.

k. Place the Police and Fire Department under a "Public Safety Commissioner."

l. Publish yearly report on "State of the City" showing progress made, financial statement, etc.

m. Adopt a budget for all City Departments.

n. Provide: "On the Job Training" for City Employees under the GI Bill of Rights.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

a. Require City Clerk to furnish Chief of Police with copy of all new ordinances passed by City Council which involve police work and instruct Chief of Police to inform all officers of such ordinances and recommendations.

b. Investigate possibility of establishing city stockade for "repeaters" to police court.

c. Require all Police Officers hired in future to pass the following requirements: Age: 25 to 45 years; Height: 5 feet 9 minimum; Weight: 160 lbs. minimum; Education: High School minimum; No conviction Record (Misdemeanor or Felony); Good Character references (three).
