## VETERANS DRAWING DISABILITY PENSIONS OR COMPENSATION

EACH FIGURE REPRESENTS 200,000 ACTIVE CASES

The number of veterans receiving disability pensions or compensation practically doubled during the first year following the surrender of Japan, Veterans Administration officials reveal. In August of 1945 there were 1,103,000 on the disability compensation rolls. One year later, the Veterans Administration was paying disability claims to 2,073,000. This increase is shown graphically above.






