Following a scoreless first quarter a fast-clicking Millen football team drew first blood here last Friday night when they scored a touchdown early in the second quarter as Ray took a long pass from Clifton, juggled it on his fingertips, finally got a touchdown grip on it and stepped over the goal line.

The sports and games of long lost days will be enacted once again during the Bulloch County Sesqui-Centennial Exposition December 4-6 when present day Bulloch Countians stage tilting contests, bareback horse races, muzzle loading musket shooting matches, wood chopping contests, turkey shoots and other historic past times in celebration of the 150th anniversary of the county's founding.
