INTRODUCTION

This report of the financial condition of the State of Ce gia as of September 30, 1946, has been delayed until this din order to obtain an option from the Attorney General Georgia as to the legal status of the \$3,750,000,00 in Revellonds issued by the subtority of the Board of Regents throw a corporation known as the Regent, of the University Stem of Georgia, in later paragraphs of these notes the status of these bonds is discussed.

The Regents by exercising the powers of a corporate entity issued the Dormitory Revenue Bonds for the benefit of the Georgia School of Technology. There is no specific act of the General Assembly authorizing the issuance of these bonds, nor was the action subject to the approval of the Governor, Attorney General or the Budget Bureau of Georgia. See Auditor's notes for opinion of Attorney General as to the legal status of this obligation.
