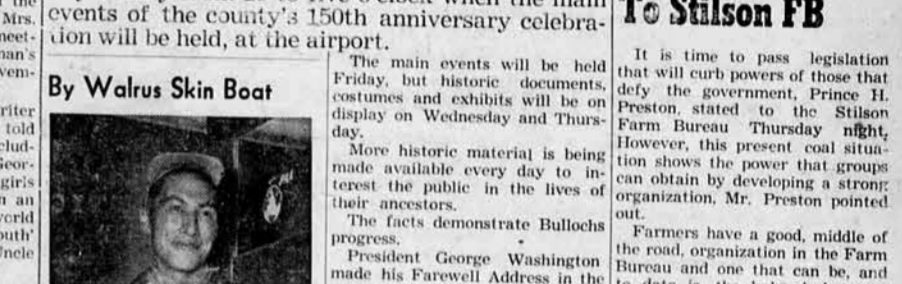

President George Washington made the Farewell Address in the year of Bulloch's founding. Napoleon I married Josephine in 1796 the same year that Bulloch was established as a county. Time marched on and Bulloch grew. Not rapidly but substantially. The records reveal that in 1845 there were 2165 white citizens and 1160 colored people. In 1868 the Indians were removed from this part of Georgia to reservations in the west. Bulloch's two original churches were founded in 1790 before the county was founded. These were the Nevils Creek church of the Baptist denomination and the Union Methodist.

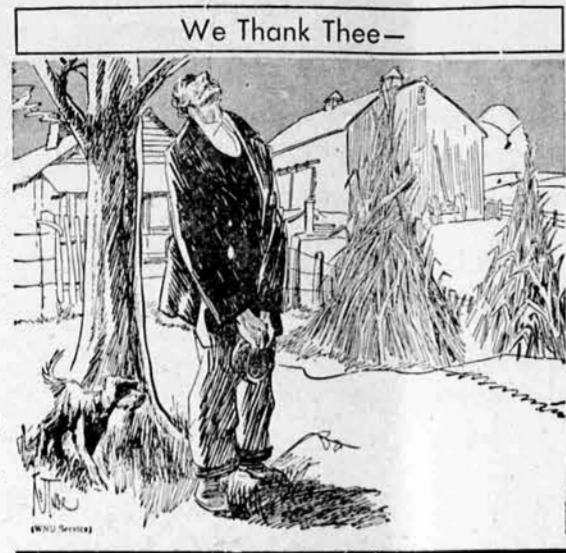

TOBACCO PLANTS NEED GOOD BEDS, FAR MAGENT ADVISES THIS WEEK. Tobacco plants need good beds, County agent Byron Dyer declared this week, advising Bulloch County tobacco growers to select good sites for their tobacco beds. Farmers who grow their own tobacco plants usually have the most successful crops. Tobacco beds with southern or southeastern exposure produce the earliest and best plants, the county agent pointed out. Blue mold is harder to control on partially shaded beds. Good, loamy, virgin soil that is

well drained is best for tobacco plant-beds and soil infested weed seed, nematode or root-knot should be avoided. Beds should be located close to a water supply. If chemicals are used for weed control, the tobacco bed should be prepared and the chemicals applied 60 to 90 days before seeding.

VETERANS WILL BE ABLE TO BORROW ON NSLI. Veterans who have converted their National Service Life Insurance to a permanent form of protection will soon be able to borrow against their policies without delay. Jack I. Biles, VA Contact Representative at Statesboro reported today. A loan division, to speed the handling of policy loans, is now being set up at the Branch 5 Insurance Service. Veterans wishing to make a loan against their policies may get the assistance of any VA contact representative in filing necessary application. Processing of an application by the loan division in Atlanta will take approximately a week. NSLI policy holders who have converted their war-time term insurance to a permanent policy may borrow up to 94 percent of the cash value of their policy. Interest on loans is 4 percent.

One of the prize exhibits at the Bulloch County Sesqui-Centennial Exposition will be a baby's cradle of the type that was commonly used 100 years ago.

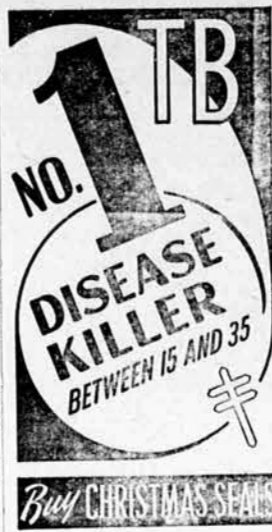
BULLOCH COUNTY SCHOOL SYSTEM OTTAWANDING IN STATE

School buses are an everyday phenomenon today, but they were rarities when the Bulloch county program of school consolidation got underway in the 1920's.

Figures released by County School Superintendent W. Earl McElveen reveal that some 2,000 young Bulloch countians ride buses to and from school each day. They ride in a total of 46 buses, the combined travel of which amounts to about 2,900 miles each day.

Originally school buses were driver-owned, but today the county owns all but three of the trucks that are used in transporting the children to and from school.

The county is now building a new garage for the maintenance of its fleet of school trucks.

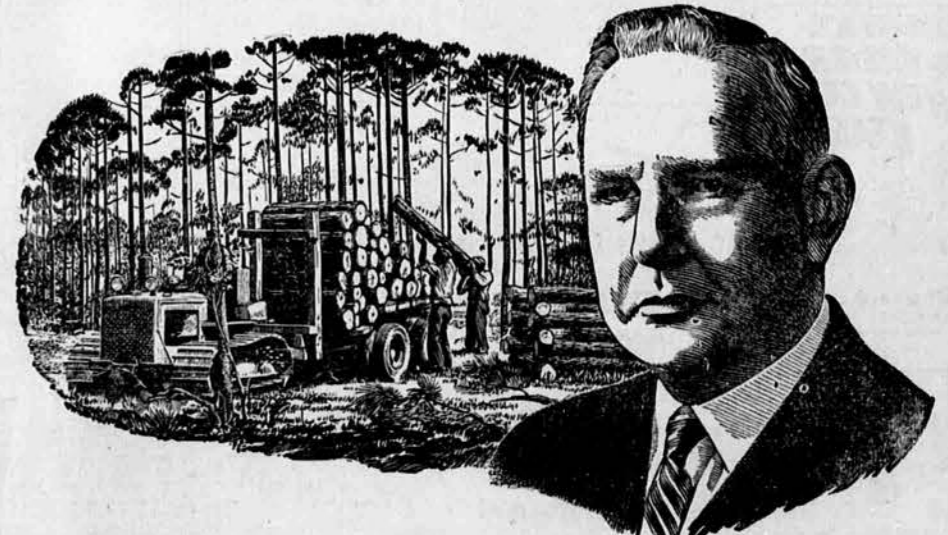

Mrs. John Belcher is ill in the Bulloch County Hospital. Her daughters, Miss Betty Belcher, Atlanta and Miss Ellie Ruth Belcher, of Savannah spent last week end with her.

Cultivated, 7,016,138 acres, 34.5 percent of the total; perennial hay, 1,611,889 acres, eight percent; pasture, 2,754,447 acres, 13 percent; woodland, 8,133,339 acres, 40 percent; wildlife areas, 193,183 acres, nine percent; miscellaneous, 627,321 acres, three percent. This plan leaves no idle acreage.

The supervisors pointed out, also, that certain "community" jobs need to be undertaken in the conservation field. These tasks include 69,394 miles of highway erosion control, 4,368,166 acres of forest fire protection and 7,700 miles of stream bank protection.

In addition to these changes, the supervisors estimated that 5,545,753 acres need terracing, 271,000 acres should be in meadow strips and terrace outlets, 2,630,000 acres of pasture should be improved, 1,215,000 acres need grubbing, 623,000 acres need draining, 1,242,000 acres should be planted to trees, pullets and hens kept in cold, drafty laying houses will produce fewer eggs than hens kept in comfortable quarters.

50,000 farm ponds should be constructed and 1,062,000 acres should be planted to kudzu.

This is a big job, and the supervisors figured out that it will take 123,867 man years, 70,703 horse years and 11,103 tractor years to establish these jobs.

Big as this job looks, a check on the past accomplishments since the establishment of the soil conservation district program shows that it can be done. Accomplishments on the 33,491 farms whose owners have sought assistance from all available agencies, in order:

## City Manager Plan Is Ideal For Small Cities

The article in the series we have been publishing on the City Manager Plan of city government. The Statesboro Junior Chamber of Commerce is promoting the plan for the city of Statesboro and is cooperating in presenting this series of informative articles.

The larger cities by no means have a monopoly on successful manager plan of government. 563 cities with population of less than 25,000 have the manager plan. Two and six-tenths percent of the communities of 1,000 to 2,500 that may legally adopt the manager charter have done so, 8.5 percent of the cities of 2,500 and 10,000 have the plan, 19.7 percent of the cities 10,000 to 25,000 are manager cities, and 27.3 percent of the cities of 25,000 to 50,000 adopted the manager form.

These percentages do not include the many cities operating under the council-manager ordinances which may be rescinded by a new council without any reference to the people's wishes. In certain states such an ordinance amounts only to a gentleman's agreement for the elected officials have a legal right to challenge the manager's administrative authority at any time.

Some of the savings and economies in the smaller cities which have the plan are so startling, and the plan has proved to work so well over so many years, that in most cities a return to the old political methods is unthinkable.

Here are some stories about small cities using the council-manager plan:

**FORT ATKINSON, Wis.** Population 5,783. This little city in the prosperous dairying region of southern Wisconsin recently was forced to vote for or against abandoning its manager form of government. During the seven manager years the tax rate for municipal purposes averaged more than 30 per cent less than during the preceding seven years. A debt retirement program is expected to put the city on a pay-as-you-go basis. Fire, police and many other services have been improved. Business-like budget, tax record, audit and monthly expenditure report systems have been installed. There have been many sensible economies, such as hiring a city engineer by the hour only when there was a job for him to do instead of salaried him full time on a \$3,000 salary.

The community voted three to two to keep the manager government, which carried every ward.

**HACKENSACK, N. J.** Population 24,568. In the old days banks were on the verge of taking over defaulting cities. Hackensack refused this tradition two years ago when under city manager auspices, it took over a bank building and made it into a magnificent city hall. The bank had built the edifice at the cost of \$250,000 but the city bought it, furnished, from the bankrupt title company for well over \$8,000 in cash.

Prior to 1933, when the city manager form of government took effect, Hackensack bonds had been offered at 58 with no takers. Now, after five years of the new regime, the city is not only on a cash basis, but it has achieved this without hoisting the tax rate. The city has at the same time gained greatly in public works. Foremost among these, because of its great importance to a community city such as Hackensack, is the recently built municipal bus station. Second of its kind in the country, seven hundred buses use the terminal daily, and bring the community only 35 minutes by bus from Times Square in New York City.

**EL DORADO, KANSAS.** Population 10,000. Despite the completion of many 1937 improvements, including storm sewer projects, beautification of parks, and a filtration and water softening plant which will save consumers \$12,000 to \$15,000 per year in soap, El Dorado announced a reduction of taxes in 1938, with promise of further reductions in 1939. El Dorado has had the manager plan for 22 years.

**MIDDLEBURY, Vt.** Population 2,000. For the first time in five years the Village of Middlebury, which started operating under the manager plan in April 1937, finished the year without spending from three to ten thousand dollars more than it collected in taxes. Starting

## VETERANS CORNER

Can a veteran change his job? Q. I am 65, the widow of a Spanish War veteran. Am I entitled to an increase in my pension?

A. The minimum monthly rate of pensions for Spanish War widows was increased last August from \$80 to \$84. The increase became effective September 1.

Q. Can I change my course of on-the-job training? Do certain jobs have limited time for training?

A. You can change your training course if you get prior VA approval.

Q. I am a veteran of World War II and am drawing 10 percent disability compensation. I have a wife and four children dependent on me. Are they entitled to compensation?

A. Yes.

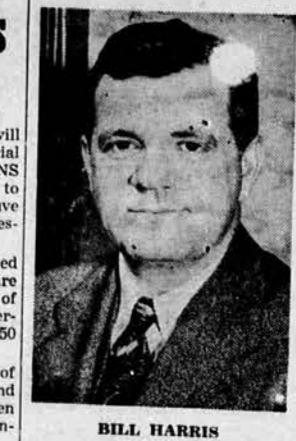
