**Through Bus Service Sought**

Mayor J. Gilbert Cone, County Chairman Fred W. Hodges, Chamber of Commerce President Allen R. Lanier, Hoke S. Brunson and Alfred Dorman, will join a group of citizens from South Carolina and Georgia on a bus trip to Jacksonville Monday afternoon to appear before the Florida Public Service Commission.

**SOCIAL SECURITY AMENDMENT PROVIDE PROTECTION FOR WAR VETERANS**

Families of deceased veterans who die within three years of the date of their discharge from causes not connected with their military service should write or contact the nearest Social Security Administration Field Office immediately if they are to collect all of the benefits to which they may be entitled under recent amendments to the Social Security Act.

Martin J. Johnson, manager of the Social Security office in Savannah, stated that in order for survivors of veterans to be eligible for Social Security benefits under the recent amendments, the veteran must have been discharged or released from active service under conditions other than dishonorable. The veteran must have served in the active armed forces of the United States between September 16, 1940 and the official end of the War, and must have served ninety days or more; or must have been discharged or released because of disability or injury incurred or aggravated in service in line of duty.

The veteran must not have died within three years after the date of his discharge or release from active service. The veteran's beneficiary may receive Old-Age and Survivors Insurance in addition to his National Service Life Insurance. However, payments under this law are not due if a survivor is qualified to receive compensation or pensions from the home economic class of Mrs. J. E. Parrish.

**Top Hereford Men to Have Entries Feb. 27**

Eight of Georgia's top Hereford breeders have entered cattle in the annual Georgia Hereford Association cattle sale to be held here February 27, according to W. S. Rice, manager of the association.

Consignments have been made by the Hills and Dales farm at LaGrange, owned by Fuller E. Callaway, Jr., who paid \$52,000 for a herd bull some few months ago. This farm had outstanding entries in 1946.

Hughes Hereford Farms, Atlanta, owned by J. W. Hughes, will also have entries. Mr. Hughes had the top entries last year and sold one bull here for \$790 to Alfred Dorman. This herd is called one of the outstanding in the South.

J. L. Lazenby, Mansfield, entered some polled cattle last year that sold exceptionally well. Mr. Lazenby is again entering these good polled cattle.

M. E. Jones, Alma, entered two young bulls in 1946 that were good and have proven to be among the top individuals in Bulloch. Mr. Jones, a banker at Alma, had bred good cattle on the side, will again have entries.

Mr. Rice stated that some 15 top young bulls and 30 outstanding heifers would be entered in this sale. Col. Tom McCord, Monticello, will be the auctioneer. The sale will be held at the Bulloch Stockyards.

**Preston Goes to Bat For Georgia**

Congressman Prince H. Preston went to bat for his home state in the House of Representatives Thursday of last week.

In an address in the House of Representatives he lifted the name of the great State of Georgia up through the black headlines of the national newspapers and spotlighted it with history, facts and figures.

The address was inspired by the recent nationwide publicity given Georgia because of the present controversy over the office of Governor.

The speech published in the Congressional Record is as follows:

Mr. PRESTON. Mr. Speaker, the current attempt to heap infamy and ridicule upon the State of Georgia by those ignorant of her history and institutions cannot go unchallenged. The time has come for men of good will to speak of hypothetical abstractions to the concrete and tangible facts of the present controversy for the office of Governor.

Georgia was one of the Thirteen Original States of the Union. Her early constitutions, like others of the Revolutionary period, placed the election of Governor and executive officials in the hands of the legislature. The era of Jacksonian democracy witnessed a series of amendments to Georgia's Constitution of 1798 showing a definite trend away from legislative control toward a better balance of power between the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of government. Among these was the amendment of 1823 which provided for popular election of the Governor. The provision of this amendment for the returns of elections was as follows:

"The returns of every election for Governor shall be sealed up by the presiding justices, separately from other returns, and directed to the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives, and transmitted to his excellency the governor, or the person exercising the duties of the governor for the time being who shall without opening the seals, cause the same to be laid before the senate on the day after the two houses have been organized, and they shall be transmitted to the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives, and the person having the majority of the whole number of votes given shall be declared elected governor of this State; but if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the two highest number of votes who shall be in life, and shall not decline an election at the time appointed for the election to elect, the general assembly shall elect immediately a governor by joint ballot; and in all cases of election of a governor by the general assembly, a majority of the votes of the members present shall be necessary for a choice. Contested elections shall be determined by both houses of the general assembly in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

**Specialist Says Fight Blue Mold**

Blue mold appeared on tobacco beds in Ware and Cook counties last week, according to J. W. Gaines, tobacco disease specialist at the Tifton experiment station.

Most Bulloch county tobacco growers have already procured a supply of fernate or other blue mold spray material. These sprays should now be applied to the beds about twice each week to prevent blue mold damage.

Fernate proved effective in the county last year. In the Statesboro community where the spray was used according to instructions, the man ample plants were available for setting the tobacco and a surplus of plants for sale.

Mr. Gaines stated that the most effective spray he used last year, 4 level tablespoons of vatsol-k, which is a wetting agent, in 25 gallons of water. A solution of 7 gallons of spray can be made up with 4 level tablespoons of fernate, 1 of salicylic acid, and 1 of vatsol-k in 7 gallons of water. It will take some 3 gallons to cover a bed with plants small as they are at the present.

Mr. Gaines pointed out that fernate alone in water made a good spray, but with the canning powder added the spray was 6 to 12 times more effective and reduced the cost about 50 per cent.

**Preston Asks U.S. To Declare Camp Stewart Surplus**

Congressman Prince H. Preston Monday of this week introduced a bill in the House of Representatives directing the secretary of war to declare Camp Stewart at Hinesville surplus.

Representative Preston said the 280,000-acre tract should be returned to 1,000 former owners. In his remarks to the House on the bill Preston said, "The War Department, in apparent disregard for the rights of the American citizens (the former occupants of the land) transferred 56,620 acres to the Forestry Service of the Department of Agriculture."

"By what right does the Forestry Service come into the possession of this land to the exclusion of the former owners?" he asked. "Yes, they claim a right under the Clark-McNary Act of 1924, but when the provision of any of the contracts where representatives of citizens of the U. S. Government should be the last one to invoke the law."

Rev. Jackson, pastor of the church will preach Sunday evening on "Noah Was Drowned?" "I shall borrow one of Dr. Lunt Newton's sermons," said Rev. Jackson. "I heard him preach once on the fact that Noah wasn't saved from the flood, but was rescued. It was the most forceful sermon on the evils of the liquor traffic I have ever heard."

**Talmadge Rally Draws Big Crowd**

More than 700 Bulloch county and representatives from neighboring counties met in a county-wide rally here Saturday afternoon to endorse the action of the General Assembly in naming Herman Talmadge Governor of Georgia. The rally was sponsored by the Bulloch County Talmadge Club.

Meeting in the court room of the Bulloch county court house the group heard talks by Columbus Alexander and Leo F. Griffin Savannah; Percy Dukes, of Pembroke; Dan R. Groover, Ben Nease, Arthur Howard, Cliff Peacock and Representative J. Brantley Johnson, all of Bulloch County. W. G. Neville, chairman of the county Talmadge Club presided at the rally.

A resolution was presented to Judge John Anderson of the city court stating that those present desired to go on record as endorsing the stand taken by the general assembly of Georgia, that they believed the Honorable Herman Talmadge is the most capable person to carry out the platform of his late father, that they favored the platform of which Herman Talmadge has committed himself, including the white primary.

The resolution also placed the group on record as being wholeheartedly in accordance with the stand taken by those Representatives and Senators who voted for the Honorable Herman Talmadge and who are supporting his platform and wholeheartedly in disagreement with the Representatives and Senators who did not support his platform.

Cards were passed out for membership in the "White Voters Club of Georgia."

Before the meeting adjourned a Bulloch County chapter of the White Voters Club was organized with W. G. Neville, president; Arthur Howard, vice-president; Mrs. J. J. E. Anderson, vice-president; E. E. Rushing treasurer; and C. Peacock, secretary.

**19 Registered On Teachers College Lab Thermometer**

Continuing he said, "The 'dry' forces are now securing signatures on a petition asking the ordinary of Bulloch to call an election. They are organized under the name of the Bulloch Association of Legal Control.

The spokesman states that they want their position clearly understood by the people of Bulloch County. "The issue is not a question of wet or dry, but a question of legal or illegal sale of alcoholic beverages in Bulloch County."

"The continued controlled sale of alcohol in the city and county means that the present dealers who pay federal license, state licenses, county and city license. If the control is legislated out, then you have a dry county. But you are far with yourself you will realize that that is wishful thinking. We will only have changed sales from legal to illegal, with the accompanying loss of revenue to the city and county, and additional expense to the law enforcement agencies in the county which will be needed to cope with the set-up under the bootlegger sales system."



# As I See It

I dare you to think about Statesboro's greatest need. During the past few days I have been asking a large number of Statesboro people what they considered to be the City's greatest need.

The great majority — almost 85 per cent — gave out the same answer: "More recreation and entertainment for our children."

Without any doubt this is true. It doesn't take much research to discover that the young people of our city are sorely lacking in entertainment facilities. We do have good movies, a modern bowling alley, and a skating rink. It doesn't completely satisfy the need.

Two steps have already been taken toward relieving the situation. Construction is to begin as soon as possible and it appears that we will have a pool by summertime.

A Statesboro baseball team is being organized and a diamond is in the planning stages. This will provide quite a lot of entertainment during the summer and will help us build better citizens. It will show that as a community we are progressive. Better still it will solve a problem more close at hand—the problem of where our children spend their leisure time.

It will require sound thinking. Start thinking about it now. Let your children out of your streets by giving them a place of their own. The cost would not be high. The results in better child development, greater safety, and less parental worry, would make any cost seem insignificant.

A second need which is no less important, is the development of a "youth center" similar to those growing up all over the nation. For our high school age group we are sorely lacking in a place "to take a date." Youngsters this age don't ask for much — a "joke" box, a place to dance, some soft drinks. Yet, we provide them with no such place.

We are letting them down. Parents tell their children not to go here and not to go there. But when the children ask, "Which place can I go to?" the usual answer is "I don't care where you go. Just don't go there."

The son or daughter has only two choices. Go, and take a chance on being caught, or, don't go anywhere. With the majority of the first choice is the usual one. Not that our children are any less moral than those living elsewhere but can you blame them?

Entertainment is pretty important at their age. Most of them don't enjoy going to these "forbidden" spots, for they still have a conscience. They would rather be somewhere else. But there is no other place.

It is time for the parents of Statesboro to wake up and see the situation as it is. The demand has been coming from our young people for some time but most parents have heard it with a deaf ear. After all, a person stays pretty busy these days, and then too, it is much easier not to listen, but it is important, then just ask your son or daughter.

We don't have to wait for something to happen to wake us up. Prevention will work much better.

With summer coming—and no school—the problem will be more important. A good time to begin working on such a project is now. Perhaps our local Parent-Teacher Association will take the lead in sponsoring it.

This will take some work. But it will pay in the long run. It will help us build better citizens. It will show that as a community we are progressive. Better still it will solve a problem more close at hand—the problem of where our children spend their leisure time.
