As I See It

I dare you to think about Statesboro's greatest need. During the past few days I have been asking a large number of Statesboro people what they considered to be the City's greatest need.

The great majority — almost 85 per cent — gave out the same answer: "More recreation and entertainment for our children."

Without any doubt this is true. It doesn't take much research to discover that the young people of our city are sorely lacking in entertainment facilities. We do have good movies, a modern bowling alley, and a skating rink. It doesn't completely satisfy the need.

Two steps have already been taken towards meeting the situation. Construction is to begin as soon as possible and it appears that we will have a pool by summertime.

Two pressing needs remain yet unfilled.

The first is a community playground with organized and supervised play for the younger children. Such a playground would keep children out of our streets by giving them a place of their own. The cost would not be high.

The results in better child development, greater safety, and less parental worry, would make any cost seem insignificant.

A second need which is no less important, is the development of a "youth center" similar to those growing up all over the nation.

For our high school age group we are sorely lacking in a place to "take a date." Youngsters this age don't ask for much — a "jake" box, a place to dance, some soft drinks. Yet we provide them with no such place.

We are letting them down. Parents tell their children not to go here and not to go there. But when the children see the "jake" where can I go? The usual answer is "I don't care where you go. Just don't go there."

It is time for the parents of Statesboro to wake up and see the situation as it is. The demand has been coming from our young folks for some time but most parents have heard it with a deaf ear. With summer coming — and no school — the problem will be more important. A good time to begin working on such a project is now. Perhaps our local Parent-Teachers Association will take the lead in sponsoring it.

It will take some work. But it will pay in the long run. It will help us build better citizens. It will show that as a community we are progressive. Better still it will solve a problem more close at hand — the problem of where our children spend their leisure time.

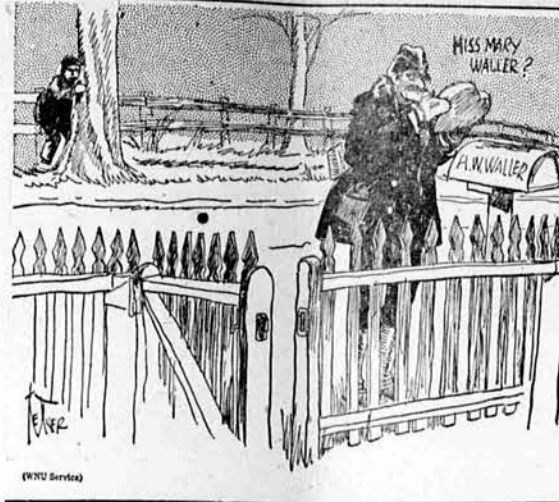

A school principal in Bulloch County recently opened his morning mail and found therein a card that made him wrinkle his brow and buzz for the visiting teacher, Miss Maude White. Scrawled boldly on a rough piece of paper were these words: "Dear Mr. (Principal): Will you send someone out here to make me go to school. I want to go to school but Ma and Pa says I can't go this year because I have to stay home and work. They don't need me out there. I wrote you. Don't answer this note they may find out."

Despite his poor spelling and violation of the rules of grammar, the youngster showed he had the stuff that makes men go. You can't rest assured the visiting teacher wasted no time in beating a trail that home. Three days after the note was written the boy was in school.

This case is typical of the problems visiting teachers are wrestling with almost every day in Georgia as they go about the job of enforcing and administering the new compulsory school attendance law. Some of their experiences are humorous, others are perplexing and still others are pathetic.

But slowly and diplomatically the visiting teachers are bringing it down what opposition there is to compulsory school attendance. They are not doing it by waving a club or a warrant in the faces of parents who are stubborn or fail to understand. They are doing it by educating parents to the necessity and importance of having their children attend school regularly.

The visiting teacher does not want to be known as a truant officer. That terminology is a thing of the past. He or she (as the case may be) is not an officer of
