## Let's Finish US 80

U. S. Highway 80 is a much-discussed subject in Statesboro at the moment. Highway engineers in Statesboro last week were securing a route for this highway to run through the city. This project is of nearly twenty years standing and must be approved or rejected by July 1, 1947.

The city of Statesboro will get \$305,000 worth of paving free, in the city limits, provided they secure the right-of-way on the route selected by the highway officials.

The city will have to buy the right of way from the property owners in the city. And the tentative route which has been selected by the highway officials runs through some highly desirable property on North College and across North Main Street.

The route which seems to meet the approval of the locating engineers will begin near the city limits on U. S. 80 on the Portol road and cross North Main Street between the homes of Mr. Elloray Forbes and Mr. C. H. Remington. It will cross North Main Street between the homes of Mrs. Dan Blitch and Mrs. George Brett and hit the Central of Georgia Railway just back of the home of Mr. C. A. Altman. It will then run across East Main Street near the cemetery and hit U. S. 80 on the long-standing project—now.

## The Money ???

The Legislature has adjourned without passing an appropriation bill.

That is just as well in view of its failure to enact measures to raise additional revenue to provide the program of expanded State services upon which Eugene Talmadge was selected Governor.

And the Legislature's refusal to pass a sales tax—while the motives of some who voted for it before and against it after the Supreme Court decision were hardly altruistic—is also perhaps just as well.

Last Summer, when the various candidates were going up and down the State promising all manner of additional and expanded services, The Atlanta Constitution kept demanding:

"Where are you going to get the money?"

The answer was not forthcoming.

Not once, so far as we can ascertain, was the sales tax or any other means of raising \$9,000,000 extra dollars mentioned.

Thus it was that the Legislature was very much on the spot. Thus it was that, in view of the absence of a mandate, many doubt the Legislature could, or should, have enacted a sales tax had the gubernatorial situation been clarified from the first.

At any rate, the State can get along on the old \$78,000,000 appropriation bill.

Moreover, there are indications that sufficient revenues will be available, with rigid economy, to pay the additional \$12,000,000 which the continued 50 percent teacher salary increase will necessitate.

Acting Gov. Thomson has said the teacher raise will be maintained even though curtailments are necessary elsewhere. Of that all Georgians will approve.

And if, as some fear, State revenues level off at \$85,000,000 rather than the necessary \$90,000,000, we are confident that Mr. Thompson, with the aid of Auditor Thrasher's sharp pencil, can find sufficient expendable bureaus and

Abroad S. S. General Meigs At Sea—March 15, 1947.

Special to the Bulloch Herald:

Dear Friends,

You never know how good it is to see somebody from home until you are far away from home, and fixating to go farther. Yesterday as I was about to board the General Meigs I saw three people walking toward me. Yes, it was somebody from home—Statesboro—Mr. C. B. Matthews, Margaret Matthews Moore and her husband.

While in Shanghai, I mentioned to Mrs. Matthews that I was sailing from San Francisco and she said she was coming out and would see me if she could. I'm certainly glad she remembered and came.

From the very first, this has been a rough voyage. Many are in bed and others look like they ought to be. So far, I'm feeling fine. I only hope I continue to do so. Last night I awoke and, being on the top bunk (3rd up) close to the bow of the ship, we really were rolling. I felt like selling "Ride 'em, cowboy." Needless to say, I refrained from such a rash thing and went back to sleep.

Everyone on board is all bundled up in his warmest clothes as it is cold. Incidentally, "everybody" numbers 1,300 passengers and over 200 crew members. We have every race, clan and creed aboard. There are three of us in our party: Mrs. Lila Watson, South Carolina; Miss Cornelia Leavell, Virginia; and I still call Statesboro home.

I am very happy because our ship is going to call at Honolulu. You remember, I spent two years there. It will be good to see the friends there again. Our ship also calls at Yokohama and Kobe, Japan, and then Shanghai.

At lunch today one passenger mentioned the children aboard, and I said I had a number of them and they were playing together. The passenger also said, "Perhaps the world should be more childlike."

With that, I am reminded our Bible tells us (Leviticus 11:6) "and a little child shall lead them."

"Fortune My Fo" is an exceptionally fine first novel, and tells the history of a family in England from 1820 to the present time.
