When the new passenger line is in operation Statesboro will be connected with Savannah, Atlanta, Milledgeville, Macon, Dublin, and Columbus by air. The company plans to operate three 21-passenger type planes.

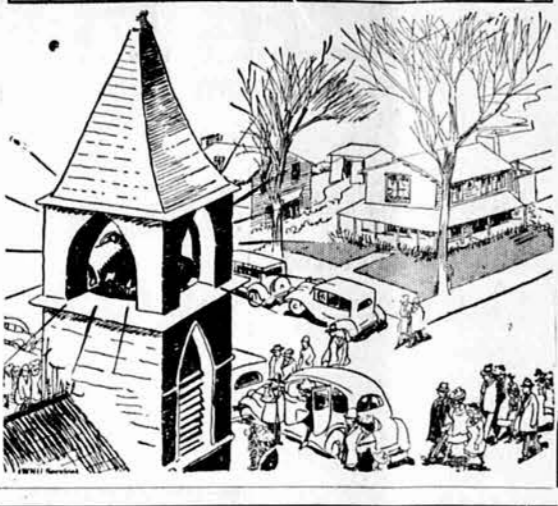
The Dogwood and Easter

The dogwood tree, annual emblem of approaching spring, is this year late in blooming, but last Sunday found a few blossoms to carry out the legend of this tree's association with event of Holy Week. Statesboro has numerous dogwood trees in its park, along the streets, in the yards of many homes, and they annually present a beautiful appearance, spreading their lovely white parasols against spring's verdure, and presenting a strikingly pure appearance in contrast to the rioting colors of Statesboro's many beautiful flowers and gardens.

The dogwood occasioned widespread interest some years ago when it was designated as a monument for Will Rogers instead of the customary stone marble stele. A contest was conducted at that time among poets to secure a poem about the dogwood tree, which had apparently been neglected as a subject for verse. The late Thomas Gamble inaugurated this contest in Savannah and was one of the most interested persons in the country in the Rogers Memorial. Following the contest, Mr. Gamble was in receipt of a poem written by Mrs. Ruth Thompson, librarian at Statesboro. The newspaper represents all the people.

It is because of the leadership of the newspaper that the people in a community have the opportunity to express themselves.

There is the expression of the people that moves a community forward.

It is the determination of the people that gives a community the will to grow.

It is the silence of the people that shackles a community.

So it is the people must have a mouthpiece and that mouthpiece is the newspaper.

In speaking for the people the newspaper must voice not what the people are thinking but what the people will be thinking.

The newspaper must at all times and at any time be ahead of the thinking of the people.

Heading the list this week is "Letty Fox," by Christine Stead. Not because it is the best, (although the publishers think highly of it), but because it is the book that everyone is going to ask for in the next few weeks. It will be very popular, and its popularity will rest squarely on Letty's own shoulders. I hope I haven't gone out on a limb by predicting that this will be sought after, but I am basing my prediction on the fact that Letty is a 1947 model "Amber." Meanwhile, Louise is living in utmost poverty, trying to earn enough to keep Edward, her son, in a special hospital for afflicted children. It is not until after her death, due to exposure, that Suzanne finds out where she is, and takes Edward home with her.

It seems a pity that Louise did not have enough faith in Rene to realize that his love for her wouldn't have suffered any change regardless of the child's condition, that his pity for the baby would have drawn them even closer. Her whole sacrifice was unnecessary.

"STRANGE AND FANTASTIC"—By Joseph Margolies.

Another grand collection of not-after-dark stories. Some of them you have probably read before, but the majority were new to me. The longest, and most interesting, is "Carmilla," by that old master of the super-natural, J. Sheridan Le Fanu.

"COME HOME, TRAVELER"—By Claud Kinnoull.

"Come Home, Traveler," by Claud Kinnoull, is a story of a very different kind of love—the self-sacrificing love of a mother for her child.

Louise and Rene Gravel have been married six years and are extremely happy. They live in French Equatorial Africa, where Rene is an official. Louise finds that she is going to have a child, and returns to France, where she can have the best medical care. She resents the baby, fearing that it will take some of Rene's affection from her. In other words—jealous.

She is visiting a friend, Suzanne, who lives on a farm, when the baby is born prematurely. To her horror, the child is a mongoloid idiot. She can't bear to think of taking the baby home to Rene, and goes to Paris where she plans to abandon the child and she will go.

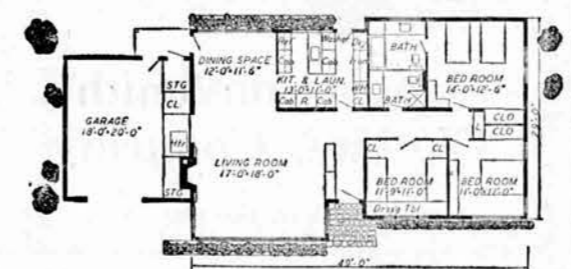
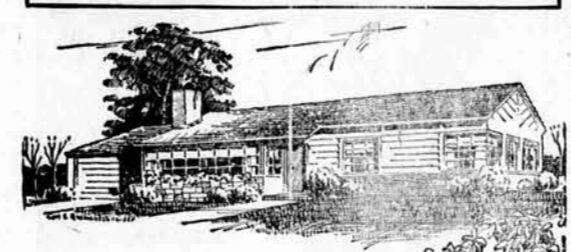

Governor's Veto Saves Ga. Primary System

Text of Gov. Thompson's Veto

Statement on "No Primary Bill"

I vetoed the "No Primary Bill", sponsored and engineered through the General Assembly by Roy Harris, because this bill is the second step in a conspiracy to destroy the One-Party System in Georgia and because it deprives all voters of that protection under law to which they are entitled.

The first step in the conspiracy of which this bill is a part was taken last November in the General Election when the author of this bill, with his cohorts, bolted the Party by conducting a write-in campaign against the Party's nominee for Governor.

They first attempted to nullify the Primary by secretly voting against its nominee. Through this bill they next attempted to abolish all primaries.

A legal Democratic Primary election, under the County Unit System, is guaranteed by the State under the Neill Primary Law, which this bill would repeal.

The legal State-controlled Primary Election was achieved only after a long struggle. Every voter in the Democratic Primary has the right to know in advance if he is qualified to vote. This bill would give him no assurance of that right.

He has the right to know if his vote will be counted. This bill denies him that safeguard.

He has the right to know if his vote will be nullified by someone that did not even cast a ballot. This bill deprives him of that right.

This, the "No Primary Bill", if permitted to become law, in reality abolishes those guarantees of suffrage upon which free Democratic government itself is based.

It was with full knowledge that they were attacking the One-Party System and assaulting the Democratic Primary that the sponsors of this bill forced it through the General Assembly.

It was with full knowledge that they were undermining the integrity of the Democratic Party itself, as well as repudiating the Primary that the sponsors of this bill conceived and carried out the bolt of last November.

If such a conspiracy against the Party as that bolt and this bill represents were permitted to succeed, Democratic Primaries in the future would become farcical.

As head of the Democratic Party in Georgia, it is my responsibility and duty to defend it against its enemies. That I have done by my veto of this bill.

The plot against the Party under the guise of a so-called "White Primary Bill" has failed.
