GOOD SEED REDUCE FAILURES, IMPROVE WATERMELON YIELDS

A good supply of high-quality watermelon seed will be available to all Georgia farmers when the Georgia Crop Improvement Association develops its certified seed program, specialists of the Extension Service said this week.

According to Elmo Ragsdale, horticulturist and L. E. Farmer, marketing specialist, only 14,224,000 market melons were produced on 56,000 acres in Georgia during 1946 compared with nearly 14,000,000 market melons grown on only 43,000 acres a year earlier.

"An additional ration of coffee and sugar," the Act read, "is to be served at... first turning out... It was a case of love at first gulp."

CHECK SECURITY REPORTS EMPLOYERS ARE URGED TO
Now is the time for employers to be preparing their Social Security reports. These reports which go to the collector of internal revenue, must cover all employees who have been working at any time in January, February, and March, 1947. Martin J. Johnson, District Manager of the Social Security Administration, advises all employers to double-check their reports to the collector, to see that each employee's Social Security account number is listed correctly. It is vitally important that the correct name and Social Security account number for each worker be shown on the report.
"There are over 87 million Social Security accounts set up in the central records office in Baltimore, Maryland," Mr. Johnson pointed out, "and hundreds of names are duplicated many times, so make sure that the names of your employees have the correct Social Security account number. Without the employee's Social Security account number, it is impossible to credit him with his earnings. The government must continue to check with the employer for all account numbers missing on the quarterly report. The employer's report cannot be cleared unless the correct name and social security number of each employee is shown."
For further information, be sure to contact your nearest Social Security field office, which is located at 66 American Building, Savannah, Georgia. Mr. Johnson and his staff will welcome all inquiries concerning your social security reports.

McLemore And Waters

Feeling the Soil Tells When to Start Garden

When You Can Make a Mudpie From Your Garden Soil, It is Too Wet to Spade.

When Slightly Moist Soil Crumbles Easily in Your Hand, It is Time to Spade.

Experienced gardeners learn much from feeling the soil. Most important of all the conditions that can be tested by getting your hands in the dirt, is the moisture content. For spading, cultivating, and seed sowing, soil which is neither too wet nor too dry is best. Wet soil should never be worked, and heavy soil when dry can be as hard as a brick. While the same soil with the right degree of moisture may be as easy to work as a sandy loam. If wet soil is spaded, it usually forms hard clods which may hold together all season to do harm in many ways. Seed should not be sown, or plants set out, in wet soil. You should not even walk on it until it dries out sufficiently.

The most reliable test is a simple one—call it the mud-pie test. Pick up a handful of soil and pat it between your palms as you used to do in childhood; if it holds together and makes a nice mudpie, stem it to extremes of too wet, and too dry when a handful of soil, patted between the palms, will crumble. It is not dry, but slightly moist, yet not wet enough to hold together in a mudpie. At this point, even clay can be spaded easily, and will break up without forming clods. When the test indicates that this favorable condition prevails, do not desist; otherwise the soil may dry out unduly, and compel you to wait for heavy rains to restore the right degree of moisture.
