Folks 'Ain't' A-dieing Like They Usta Say Health Dept.

That Georgia's population is on the increase, there need be no doubt whatsoever. In fact, according to Dr. T. F. Abercrombie, state health director, Georgia's births exceed her deaths by better than three-to-one.

In his annual report to the State Board of Health, Dr. Abercrombie revealed that Georgia's death rate in 1946 was the lowest in history—28,995 deaths compared to 82,078 births.

The veteran health director disclosed that there were 186 births for every 100 deaths twenty years ago, whereas, last year, the ratio was 305 births to 100 deaths. He attributed the lowered death rate to outstanding advancements in the field of public health.

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Dodd Is Head of District Legion

STATESBORO, Ga., April 28. — Congressman Prince H. Preston, of the First District, accused the Republicans of blocking legislation furthering the benefits of veterans, Monday afternoon in the principal address to the First District American Legion held in the auditorium of the Georgia Teachers College.

In proving his point, the congressman, himself veteran of the Normandy invasion, named Pat Kearney, representative from New York, as the only Republican who signed a petition to raise the salary ceiling for on-the-job training program.

Objective of the Republicans in their drive to defeat these measures and their intention of slicing the budget by cutting appropriations for the armed forces and the Veterans Administration, he said, was to form a substantial plank in their platform for 1948 at which time they expect to elect a Republican President.

A former captain, who enlisted as a private, Congressman Preston cited the fact that despite pleas by Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson, the Republican party plans to maintain a budget of \$72 billion dollars regardless of the nation's security.

In his closing remarks, he praised the work of John Thomas Taylor, director of the national legislative counsel of the American Legion since its formation in 1919. He said that Mr. Taylor is one of the most respected personalities on Capitol Hill.

"The force of the American Legion is great and has never been directed in the wrong direction to stimulate the interests in your organization. It is the greatest civic organization in the country," the congressman declared.

The gathering of Legionnaires and members of the Ladies Auxiliary rose to greet Congressman Preston, and to applaud him in the conclusion of his speech.

Upon the invitation from Savannah Post 135, it was voted that next year's district convention be held in Savannah.

In an election held prior to the principal address, the young replaced the old as A. S. Dodd, Jr., commander of Statesboro Post No. 90, and 33-year-old former Navy lieutenant junior grade, was chosen district commander, succeeding William L. Kilroy, Chattanooga Post No. 36.

H. S. Durden, Jr., Swainsboro Post 103, 28-year-old graduate of the University of Georgia, Athens and former captain with the First Cavalry Division, was selected senior vice-commander of the district. While at the university, Mr. Durden was instrumental in organizing the Mangleburg-Eldred Legion Post.
