My Community - Today And Tomorrow

My community today is a thriving town which is the center of a large agricultural and stock-raising section. But what will it look like in the future? It is the duty of each of us to make Statesboro a better place in which to live and work. To achieve this, the cooperation and support of all the people in my community will be needed.

Statesboro has a mayor and council type of government, but since the city manager type of government has proved so effective in other towns the size of Statesboro, I believe that we should have a city manager. The public water and sewerage system of my town is rather good, but it does not give service to all of the people.

We have combined the city and county health department, which has free clinics and a health engineer to inspect the town for unhealthful conditions. Additional trained personnel, such as doctors and nurses, are needed to give medical advice and service to the people of the county. The Bulloch County Hospital, the only one in the county, has excellent medical facilities but it needs more rooms, doctors and nurses.

The educational facilities of Bulloch County are inadequate; we need new buildings for the grammar school and band with new equipment and more teachers. The present school system has eleven grades but next year the twelfth grade is to be added. Georgia Teachers College, located near Statesboro is a great asset to the community. We have a regional library in our town and very soon we are going to build a new building for it. I think that this should be a living memorial to the service of Bulloch County.

The people of my community should be given more opportunity for cultural development. A large city auditorium, municipally-owned, should be built in Statesboro so that great singers, orchestras, bands, play productions and speakers could put on programs here. The auditorium would also serve as a place where conventions of large meetings could be held.

Religion is one of the most important things in a person's life. We have four churches of the major denominations and several other smaller churches in our

Fun at Home

Boys and Girls: Read this to yourselves! Try it for yourselves!

Your adventure for this week is a trip to the Indian signal ground. The Indians used to build fires to send up smoke signals at the highest point in the county. Why don't you ride or hike out there and build a small picnic fire for yourself? (Be sure that every spark is out before you leave.)

The easiest way to find this high point is to go on the Pembroke Road to Warnock School. Take the road just south of the school and go east up the hill. You will have to decide for yourselves exactly what the highest point is. We believe it is in a broad, flat field, from which you can see the towers of Statesboro. We had supper there, but did not see any signs of Indians. Mr. Fred Hodges could tell you what arrowheads and other Indian things have been found there.

If you folks drive a party you to the hill for a picnic you could easily hike back to Statesboro. The country road by the hill leads back to town; it is a very pretty walk.

I keep a "Fun" scrapbook. Whenever I get a good game at a party or see one in a magazine, I paste it in. I have a big envelope, too, for things like paper puzzles that do not fit in a book. You might start either an envelope or a scrapbook for "Fun" ideas.

After your family is through with this paper every week, you could cut out the suggestions in "Fun at Home." This week you may not have time to make a candle streeter such as I tell about below. If you wanted to in the middle of the summer, you would look in your scrapbook and see the directions. The book could also have games and puzzles from your Sunday School paper, from magazines, the Sunday funny paper, and from cereal boxes. Sometimes when you are sick in bed or run out of things to do, open your scrapbook and spend a pleasant afternoon with the things in it.

A fine thing for the neighborhood gang to do as it gets dark at night is to have a "candle street-car parade." During the day, you cut window holes in the side of a shoe box and a chimney hole in the top. Under the chimney you put a short candle. A long string for pulling it is tied through one on top of the box. About seven-ty or eight at night you all light the candles and pull the streetcars down the road behind one another. with the farmer needs to be improved. Statesboro ranks among the highest in the sale of tobacco in the state and has eight warehouses, three of these built in the last year. Many types of crops grown in Bulloch County, including tobacco, cotton, peanuts, watermelons and sugar cane, are sold through local markets. Since so much cotton is grown in this region, I think that some cotton mills should be built here. More processing plants for raw materials grown in this section are needed. If the crops of Bulloch County are prepared for the consumer market in our own section, the farmers can make more profit and thus the economic condition of Bulloch County will be improved. A radio station, WWNS, has recently been constructed in my community which affords the people information and entertainment.

Because we have mild winters, we should develop a tourist trade much like Florida has. Better hotels, restaurants and filling stations with courteous service are needed for transients.

The only recreational facilities for the young people in Statesboro are a skating rink, bowling alley, country club and two picture shows. In the future I hope that my community will build a swimming pool, community center, tennis courts, a baseball diamond, concrete bleachers at the football field and a teen-age center.

If, in the future, my community is to become a prosperous town, industry within the people as well as mechanical industries must be better developed. This will take a lot of hard work on the part of the citizens of Statesboro, but it will make for us and the generations to follow us a better place in which to live.



## Veterans Corner

How long does the readjustment allowance program continue? May a divorced woman claim part of a veteran's pension? Does a veteran have to pay a fee to get a guaranteed loan?

Here are the answers to these and other questions which former servicemen regularly ask contact representatives of the Veterans Administration:

Q. I divorced my wife on the grounds of desertion and would like to know if she can claim part of my pension?

A. The divorce discontinues marital relationship and your wife could not successfully claim a portion of your pension unless she successfully contests the divorce.

Q. How long after discharge from the armed services is readjustment allowance available to a veteran?

A. Readjustment allowances are available to an eligible veteran at any time after his discharge or release until two years after the official termination of the war, whichever is later.

Q. Can I specify in my National Service Life Insurance policy that in event my wife remarries after my death, payment of the balance of insurance benefits should be made to my mother?

A. No.

Q. Who is entitled to the last compensation or pension due a veteran in event of his death?

A. The check received at the time of the veteran's death becomes a part of his estate. The person who bears the expense of the last sickness may apply for the burial award of \$150.

Q. Does the veteran have to pay any charges or fees to get a guaranteed loan?

A. The veteran pays no commission, brokerage fees or other charges for obtaining a guaranteed loan.

During the afternoon the people of the town gathered at the community house to see Jean, to talk to her, and to bring her dolls, clothes, toys, and money. There was ice cream and peppermint candy. There were little boys and girls, and even the older men turned out to help this little girl with so much courage celebrate her birthday.

Saturday afternoon after the party Jean had to come back to the hospital for a while longer. Her right arm and both legs are still completely bandaged but her face is unbandaged.

As we talked with her she told us of the party and what a good time she had. She told us about the gifts and we asked her if she had sort of a special "boy friend" whom she saw Saturday. She had a quick reply for that one as she said: "I love my daddy."

Life has been unkind at times to little Jean Kirkland. But through it all she has been smiling. This week her smiles were even broader than usual for she knows that friendship is warm and true—and everlasting.
