The Regents by exercising the powers of a corporate entity issued the Dormitory Revenue Bonds for the benefit of the Georgia School of Technology. There is no specific act of the General Assembly authorizing the issuance of these bonds, nor was the action subject to the approval of the Georgia. See Auditor's notes in financial report of Sept. 30, 1946, for opinion of Attorney General as to the legal status of this obligation. Ruling was that this item was not an obligation of the State that it could not be retired from tax or appropriated funds, being an obligation of and payable only from the earnings of the dormitory.


