## F. N. Grimes Dies Monday

Frank N. Grimes, 71, prominent Statesboro citizen for many years, died at his residence early Monday morning, following an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Grimes, a native of Bulloch County, was a large planter and widely known and beloved throughout his section of the state, where he had a large family connection. Despite his age, Mr. Grimes was very active until a short time ago and served as chairman of the Bulloch County Draft Board from its organization until its office was closed here in the spring.

Mr. Grimes is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Leodea Coleman and Mrs. Virginia Grimes Evans, both of Statesboro; one granddaughter, Miss Anne Evans of Statesboro; one sister, Mrs. M. Y. Allen, of Mount Airy, N. C.

Funeral services were held at the residence on Savannah Avenue Tuesday afternoon with the Rev. Earl Soren in charge of the services. Burial was in East Side cemetery. Active pallbearers were selected from the board of deacons of the First Baptist Church, of which Mr. Grimes was a member and an active deacon. They included: J. L. Mathews, W. D. Anderson, Dr. H. F. Hook, W. G. Cobb, Glenn Jennings and S. D. Grover. Smith-Tillman Mortuary was in charge of funeral arrangements.

## Vets Office Is Assured

Veterans in Bulloch and surrounding counties will not be left without a local veterans office when the Veterans Administration office here closes this month. J. Brantley Johnson, representative to the State Legislature, announced this week that he had been assured by the State Department of Veterans Service that a Veterans Service Office will be established here by the state.

In a letter to the State Veterans Service Department officials Mr. Johnson pointed out the great need for a veterans office in this locality. He cited the work done by the Veterans Administration office which has been operated by the Federal Government for some time since the end of the war.

In replying to Mr. Johnson's letter, C. Arthur Cheatham, director of the Dept. of Veterans Service for the state, authorized the legislator to begin organizing a Veterans Affairs Committee. This committee will be composed of some 25 leading citizens and will advise and cooperate with the local office and with the state department.

No definite date or location has been established for opening the new office here.

## S. H. S. and T. C. Get Link Flying Trainers

Statesboro High School and Teachers College are two institutions in the state which have applied to the State Department of Education for the use of a Link flying trainer during the coming school year.

Some 20 schools in the state have applied for the trainers, which will be used to teach elementary aviation and to be used in demonstrating problems in physics, geometry, and other courses of study.

The trainers will be moved to the schools from naval bases throughout the state, where they were used to train pilots. The trainers have all the elements usually included in the cockpit of a plane and by moving the body of the trainer actual flying conditions are simulated.

## General Says Be Prepared Paving Contract Let By Council

Mayor Gilbert Cone this week announced the awarding of a contract for paving North College Street from the point where it intersects Portal highway to where it crosses West Jones Avenue, and for paving of Grady Street from South Main to the Bulloch County Hospital.

## Highway Associations To Merge For Promotion Of U.S. Highway 301

Some forty officials of the Burton's Ferry Highway Association met in Statesboro Friday and mapped plans for combining their organization with the "Tobacco Trail Association," an organization promoting U. S. Highway 301 which was recently extended to pass through Statesboro.

At the same time the group received an invitation extended in behalf of the citizens of Statesboro by Alfred Dorman, president of the Burton's Ferry Association, to attend a barbecue and celebration being planned for late October to signify the completion and opening of the Burton's Ferry Highway.

The association, composed of representatives from cities lying along the Burton's Ferry route, went on record as approving a plan to merge their group with the "Tobacco Trail Association," which has headquarters in Wilkeson, N. C., and which has for its purpose the promotion of tourist traffic along U. S. 301. Spokesmen for both groups pointed out that through a combination of forces a much more effective campaign could be carried out in promoting tourist traffic.

Officers of the Burton's Ferry Association were authorized to make plans for the merger and to take part in a joint undertaking with the second organization in placing signs along U. S. 301 in planning directions and information. The signs have been ordered and installation is expected to get underway as soon as delivery is made.

In announcing plans for the celebration of the opening of the highway, Mr. Dorman said that Statesboro would like to be host to the highway group, as well as to mayors and civic officials along the route, highway officials, and the governors of Georgia, Florida, North and South Carolina, and Virginia. He said the date would be set as soon as possible and would be set so as to conflict with any other celebration already planned in cities along the route. The airport grounds have been tentatively set as the site.

School Days

School opened Monday. And, with the opening of school, hundreds of youngsters in Statesboro and Bulloch county will be walking, riding bicycles, and driving automobiles, and walking to school. Many of these youngsters will be going to school for the first time. We can choose no more fitting time than school opening to point out to parents and school children alike the necessity of safety precautions. Last year 3,150 school children were killed and 130,000 were injured. With your help this year we can lower that figure. Being safe is not hard. It does not require unusual intelligence. It only requires common sense and being careful. There are eight rules for safe use of the streets. If these are impressed upon a child's memory as he begins school life they will become such a secondary nature that he will automatically do the right and safe thing throughout life. CORNERS ONLY AT 1. CROSS STREETS ONLY AT 1. REASON: The motorist does not expect pedestrians to cross in mid-block and often cannot see them as they start across the street. 2. LOOK! BE SURE THE WAY IS CLEAR BEFORE YOU CROSS. REASON: Even at intersections the motorist doesn't expect a pedestrian to dart out suddenly from the curb. If there is a signal, the driver expects you, too, to obey it. Also, the driver has many eyes to watch at intersections. 3. WALK - DON'T RUN - STRAIGHT ACROSS THE STREET. REASON: If you walk you are not apt to stumble. Any approaching driver can judge better what he should do. He doesn't expect...

This is the season for carnivals. Not the "carnival" we think of when we vision "Mardi Gras" or a big city-wide festival, but the "carnival" of "peep-shows" and gaming tables, which usually shows on the edge of town for a few days and then, pockets heavy with money, moves on to a new location and a new group of "suckers". That the State Department of Education at a fiscal cost of \$150,000 a year provides state aid for local and county free libraries and from this rural library fund that this regional library (Headquarters Bulloch County Library) received \$3,671.15 a year? That the library is supported locally by the Bulloch and Bryan Boards of Education, Bulloch Board of Commissioners and the City of Statesboro?
