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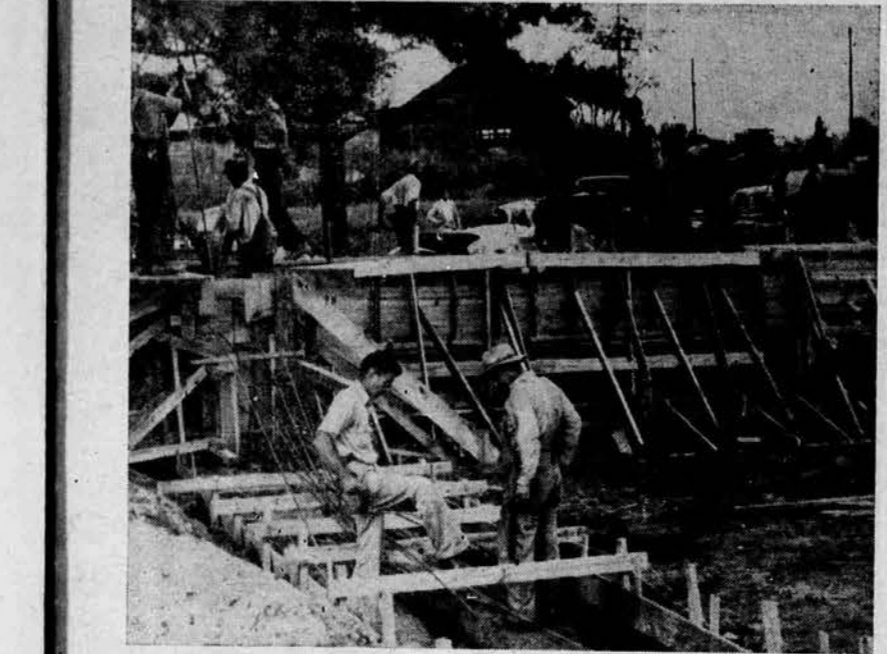

On October 8, Mr. Robertson, as assignee, mailed a letter to all the depositors of the bank, stating: "This action was found necessary on account of his (Mr. Hughes) decision to retire from the public banking business, as well as the difficulty and necessary delay in collecting some of his notes receivable, and his desire that all depositors be treated alike."

With the price support programs expiring in 1948, new legislation must be written during the coming session of Congress. Some sections of the United States, where agriculture is also the major source of income, have other ideas about the type of support program needed. These sections have strong Farm Bureaus. They could outvote the southern members at the national convention and call for a reduction in the support program.

Congressman Preston pointed out that the Farm Bureau represented farmers and watched every bill introduced to see if they affected the farmer directly or indirectly. The representatives in Congress always immediately heard from the Farm Bureau on bills that affected the farmer. Those opinions were always fair enough to cause members of the Congress to state on the floor the Farm Bureau's feelings toward the bill. Only the service organizations enjoy this recognition. Fair play on a "live and let live" basis by the Farm Bureau.

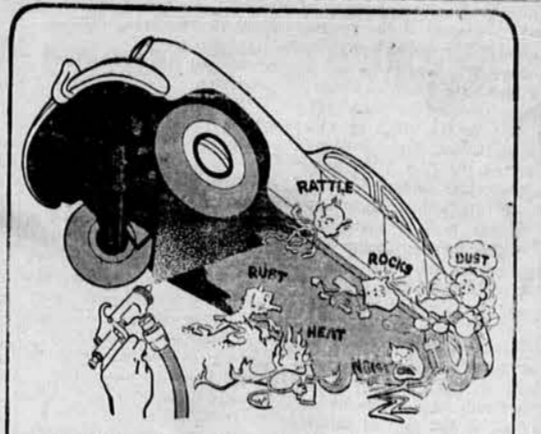

He charges that "because of insufficient attention given to eyesight the result today is death of motorists with 40 mile an hour vision behind the wheels of 90 miles an hour automobiles."

County Farm Bureau To Steer Clear Of Politics

The Bulloch County Farm Bureau will keep completely clear of coming elections as far as personalities are concerned.

This fact was made known Thursday night by the officers of the 11 community chapters and the county organization. Nearly 35 men make up the Bulloch County Farm Bureau policy committee, which includes the presidents, vice-presidents, and secretaries of all chapters. They voted to stick to the constitution and by-laws of the organization and to resign when they announced for a remunerative public office and to ask all candidates to refrain from visiting Farm Bureaus other than the one of which they are a member during the campaign.

Candidates and prospective candidates attended the meeting and expressed themselves as being 100 percent for this action.

The constitution and by-laws state that a public officer who draws compensation for the office held is not eligible to be an officer in the Farm Bureau, and that if an officer in the Farm Bureau becomes a candidate for such an office he shall be deemed thereby immediately disqualified and his term of office shall immediately and automatically terminate.

The 35 men present also expressed the belief that if a candidate visited another Farm Bureau to keep this feeling from the general public it is a member during the campaign his presence would be interpreted by many as being of a political nature, regardless of what official business the candidate might have at the meeting. To keep this feeling from the general public, a committee composed of J. A. Hart, H. U. Knight and B. F. Deal was named to discuss the Farm Bureau's position with every candidate after they had announced.

W. C. Bradford 'Milks' Rattlers at County Fair

The most talked-of attraction on the midway of the Bulloch County Fair, now in progress, is that of W. C. Bradford and his collection of wild and poisonous snakes. Mr. Bradford, who owns the Ogeechee Animal Farm at Davidsboro, has with him on the midway here a collection of rattlers, cottonmouths, and a Gila monster. He gives lectures on poisonous reptiles while visitors are viewing his snakes. He demonstrates the process involved in "milking" rattlesnakes during his lecture.

A veteran of World War II, Bradford has been handling reptiles for over 25 years. Recently, he had to have the thumb on his left hand amputated following the bite of one of his rattlers.
