"AN ORDINANCE
"Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Statesboro as follows:

"Section 1. Discharge, firing or use of fire crackers, rockets, torpedoes, Roman candles or other fire-works of substances designed or intended for pyrotechnic display, and pistols, canes, cannons, or other appliances using blank cartridges or caps containing chlorate or potash mixture, is hereby prohibited. Provided that the Mayor or Council may order the public display of fire-works by properly qualified individuals.
