

Peanut Quotas To Be Voted On **December 9**


Bulloch peanut grower urged this week to circle Tuesday, December 9, on their calendars as the day to vote to determine the question of marketing quotas for the next three years -1948, 1949 and 1950.

In Athens, T. R. Breedlo state director of the Production and Marketing Administration, called on every eligible grower to cast his ballot on the designated day. He placed special emphasis on the importance of the issue, pointing out that the approval or disapproval of markeintg quotas also will determine the allowable price support rates on future pea-nut crops.

"If quotas are approved," Director Breedlove said, "farmers, whose 1948 peanut acreage does not exceed the farm allotment will be eligible for government loans or purchases on their entire peanut crops at 90 per cent of parity. Those whose acreage exeligible for price support only on the peanuts produced in excess of their 1948 farm marketing quota, and the loan or purchase rate or he excess will be 54 per cent of
