City Election Is December 5th; Maybe Dec. 6th

City authorities are in a quandary. Is the city election day the first Friday in December, or the first Saturday in December. That is the question they are asking.

According to the new charter for the city of Statesboro, provided for in legislation in the last session of the General Assembly, the city election comes on the first Friday in December. But a recent ruling of the Georgia Supreme Court declared all legislation of a local nature invalid before its ratification by the voters at the proper advertising of the bills.

According to the old charter, the election day comes on the first Saturday in December.

And three places on the city council must be filled by election. So, when is election day? If the new charter is believed to be valid the election will be held on Friday, December 5. If not, then Saturday, December 6, will be election day.

It will be decided later.

According to the new charter, the city registration book is open at all times from 8 a. m. to 12 noon, and from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m., except Sundays and holidays.

"According to the new charter, the election, and during said 30 day period said registration book shall remain closed insofar as registration of voters for the pending election are concerned."

Inquiry at the city office indicates that the deadline for qualifying as a candidate for councilman is today. Qualifying fee is \$15 (under the new charter).

Yesterday only three candidates had qualified: Bill Bowen, A. B. McDougald, and W. W. Woodcock, each to succeed himself.

City Gets New Street Sweeper

Bill Bowen, chairman of the City Sanitation Department, announced this week that the City of Statesboro will put into operation immediately a new pick-up Austin-Western Street Sweeper.

This sweeper is the latest and most modern piece of equipment the Austin-Western Company makes.

Mr. Bowen states that the new sweeper will eliminate the use of the old type sweeper, one truck and four men. This, according to Mr. Bowen, will save the city a large amount of money. The new Austin sweeper will require only one man to operate it and it picks up sand and litter on the streets as it sweeps.

According to Mr. Bowen, the machine will be operated at night and it will be necessary for the public to refrain from parking their cars on the streets overnight. They must be parked off the paved streets in order for the machine to operate.

The Sanitary Department also wishes to call your attention to the piling of trash and leaves in the gutters on paved streets. In many instances people are leaving trash on paved streets. This is strictly against the city ordinance. When trash is piled in the street gutters and it rains the storm sewers become stopped up. City officials also point out that the burning of leaves and trash on the pavement causes great damage and should not be done.

PEANUT GROWERS URGED TO VOTE PEANUT QUOTAS

Peanut growers must support quotas, is the feeling with which the Bulloch county delegation returned from the State Farm Bureau convention held last week in Macon.

These delegates, mostly peanut growers, doubted the advisability of the quotas before going to the convention, but are now convinced of the need for them.

"GROWERS ARE URGED TO PRESENT accurate data on peanuts sold, using sales tickets, income tax returns, record books and other records."

If the Marshall Plan is adopted at the special session of Congress the foreign market for edible peanuts will be improved and there is the possibility of securing a resolution passed suspending the quotas for 1948.

However, they believe there is no alternative at the present time. R. P. Mikels, president of the county Farm Bureau, explains that not voting for quotas would, in effect, be like telling Congress that local growers are not interested in any kind of a price support program.

W. H. Smith, Jr., was renamed a director from the first district. Resolutions were introduced for rural mail deliveries on highways in southern county and for rural mail deliveries in northern county.

Two or three automobiles are wrecked each week in Bulloch county by livestock roaming on highways. A referendum should determine whether the open range policy should be abandoned. One-third built for motorists. They were not built to serve as ranges for livestock. No one doubts the threat of death with a cow or hog on the highway. Yet we still permit an open range policy to threaten the motorist. The open range policy is the same as no law at all. This policy is an anarchist's answer to his prayers.

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U.S. Route 80 Through Statesboro Is Approved

The new route for U.S. Highway 80 through the City of Statesboro is now assured and it is hoped that the contract for the project will be let at an early date.

Mayor J. Gilbert Cone was advised recently by Mr. John C. Beasley, chairman of the State Highway Board, that the survey of the Urban Project through Statesboro on U. S. 80 is practically complete and has the approval of the Bureau of Public Roads.

Mr. Beasley wrote Mayor Cone that he knows of no objection to the proposed route of the plans and that it is hoped that the contract for the project will be let at an early date.

The amount of the project will come to about \$305,000 worth of paving within the city limits. The proposed route will run off U. S. 80 near the city limits on the Portal side of Statesboro, cross North College street, North Main street and hit U. S. 80 near the city limits on the Savannah side of Statesboro.

Mr. Beasley stated that every effort will be made this year to string the lights all the way down the business section of West Main street. Heretofore, the lights have extended only halfway down this street.

For the greater part of 1947 St. John revisited a majority of the 29 counties he covered as a war correspondent. Unlike most reporters, St. John steered clear of the larger cities in his war-circles of Europe. Instead, he roamed freely about the countryside and lived in small villages where he could get to know the people personally.

Never an armchair commentator, St. John is admired by his colleagues because he went far below the surface to get his stories of the war. He welcomed danger and risk if it stood in his way of getting his stories back to his readers.

St. John knows what it is to see bombs rain from the sky, to evacuate towns and troops under heavy fire, and to view death and destruction on all sides. He himself missed death many times, and still carries a Nazi bullet in his leg, a memento of the campaign in Greece.

After escaping from Greece on the last British evacuation ship, St. John arrived in England to become the National Broadcasting Company's London commentator. There he was not content to just report the news, but worked in a munitions factory, helped dig air raid victims from the rubble that was London, and flew with the R. A. F. in flights over the North Atlantic.

The war was not the beginning of St. John's colorful career. Behind this dramatic experience lies a long and distinguished career as a reporter and editor. St. John is probably the only man in the world with scars on one leg from the Chicago gangster Al Capone, and a bullet in the other from Europe's Public Enemy Number One, Adolph Hitler.

St. John feels that a third world war is not inevitable, because in all his travels he never found an individual who wanted war.
