The old city charter called for the election to be held on Saturday, December 6.

The attorney for the City of Statesboro checked with state authorities in Atlanta this week end and they stated that it was their belief that the city could go ahead and hold the election under the new city charter and it would stand up legally.

There are three candidates in the race and all are unopposed.

3 Bulloch 4-H'ers To Go to Chicago

Three Bulloch county 4-H Club boys have been declared state winners and are being given trips to Chicago this week to the National 4-H Club Congress.

De Vaughn Roberts is the state meat animal champion, Bobby Martin the feeding and grazing champion, and C. J. Williams the tractor maintenance champion. All three are members of Nevils 4-H Club.

De Vaughn has been regarded as one of the state's outstanding livestock clubbers for three years but never tried for the championship until this year. He has been awarded a 17 jewel watch for his achievement and has entered regional competition for the trip to Chicago. He finished out 55 hogs and 20 steers this year, and has a herd of purebred hogs started. He is president of his club for the second year and boys' vice-president of the county council.

'Air Attack' Over City On Nov. 30

Forty planes of the Georgia Air National Guard will perform a defensive operation over Statesboro Sunday, November 30, at 3:34 p. m., according to a bulletin from The Bulloch Herald today by Adjutant General Alpha A. Fowler Jr., of Atlanta.

A five-day school for the Baptist ministers of southeast Georgia will be held at the First Baptist Church of Statesboro December 1-5. The school will be directed by the Georgia Baptist Department of Evangelism. The school will be primarily one of Bible study with secondary emphasis being placed upon homiletics, theology, and church administration. The faculty will be composed of Dr. H. C. Whitner, head of the Department of Evangelism; Rev. F. J. Hendrix, member of the department; and Dr. R. T. Russell, former pastor of the First Baptist Church of Waycross.

Of great interest to the public is the fact that the preaching hours will be open to the general public and will be held each day at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., beginning with the Monday evening service and continuing through the Friday morning hour. Dr. Jerry Garrison, pastor of the Bull Street Baptist Church, Savannah, will be one of the guest preachers.

Pastor T. Earl Stone stated that the public is cordially invited to attend and says that if you want to hear some real good preaching, "Come hear a preacher preach to a group of fellow-Baptist ministers."

Bulloch Is Not For Sale

Bulloch county held an election on November 19. And we know now that Bulloch county is not for sale! The Herald commends the candidates, the campaign workers, the voters, the election holders, on one of the most orderly primaries ever remembered in the county. Other counties in Georgia are finding their elections mere auctions, in which the office goes to the highest bidder with some of the candidates doing the bidding and some of the voters doing the selling. Nearly 5,000 Bulloch county citizens with the right to vote to the polling places in twelve militia districts and voted sanely and with the conviction that they were voting for the best man, and that the man elected would be the choice of the people. Election night the court house was crowded—but it was a friendly crowd. There was little or no drunkenness—only a keen interest in who won. An age-old custom was abandoned and a sore spot was cleared up in local elections that day—the custom of candidates standing on the stairs leading up to the courtroom polling place, and the stairs were clean and free of the hundreds of campaign cards. Voters appreciated the candidates abandoning the custom. We commend the candidates. Other counties in Georgia would do well to follow the lead taken by Bulloch county—elections can be made clean and decent. We're proud of this great county, Bulloch.

Bulloch Is Rough On Murder

A murderer in Bulloch county finds the going rough. Ask Dewey Collins and Coy Collins, now in the county jail charged with the murder of Holcomb Burnsed. On Saturday, the first of November, Holcomb Burnsed was found brutally murdered—believed to be the most brutal killing since the Hodges incident in 1904. A gully-washing rain the night after wiped out all clues and signs left around the house where the man was killed. Yet on November 11 Coy Collins was in the custody of the sheriff, and on November 14 Dewey Collins was also in custody of the sheriff. It is believed that the evidence which is in the hands of the sheriff's office is conclusive and will lead the accused to conviction. We congratulate Stothard Deal, the sheriff, James Rushing, his deputy, the members of the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, and all those connected with the local sheriff's office and cooperating communities in running down those believed to be the murderers. It should be a lesson... a murderer has rough going in Bulloch county.

Bad Publicity

Georgia received another bit of bad publicity recently when Mr. Morris and the Augusta Chronicle. Knowing how vindictive Mr. Harris, a thwarted politician with top-ranking political figures, resorted to defamatory in a public court room. It is a sad comment on democracy when men in the belt. However, Mr. Morris, the public eye, as Messrs. Harris and Morris are, let their tempers flare in such flagrant manner. It is no smacks a little of the doings of one once prominent "Hellbent" Edwards.

We can't help wondering, though we know full well that Georgia is only one of the nation's 48 states, just how this incident appeared to other peoples throughout the world. To the many millions now baffled and befuddled by the issues of communism, democracy, and other political ideologies, this demonstration of temper must have been regarded as a severe indictment of democracy. Some, no doubt, looked upon it as a failure of a type of government which is supposed to set an example for understanding and reason as opposed to force.

We aren't familiar with all details leading up to the incident. We understand that Mr. Harris, as the anonymous editor of the Augusta Courier, a political sheet,

Neighboring City to Observe Centennial December 21 Thru 24

When the City of Sylvania celebrates her 100th anniversary December 21 through December 24, one of the interesting events in the history of the town which will be reenacted is the famous Dow Legend. In 1794 the little village of Jacksonboro, located five miles north of Sylvania, sprang up on each side of Beaver Dam Creek in Screven County. Because of its location, approximately half-way between Savannah and Augusta, it early became an important state-coach stop and developed into a lustrous community. In 1830 an itinerant evangelist, Lorenzo Dow, came to Jacksonboro to conduct a meeting in the Methodist Church. Citizens of Jacksonboro considered him an eccentric and not only prohibited his holding services, but refused to give him shelter for the night. The legend says that Dow was pelted with overripe eggs and generally mistreated by the citizens of the frontier town. The minister found shelter from his assailants, however, in the home of Seaborn Goodall. The next morning he found the people of the town no more receptive to his pleadings for the salvation of their souls and was escorted to the rustic bridge which spanned Deaver Dam Creek. He was intended to leave the scene and never return.

Taking off his shoes and shaking the dust from them, Dow, to show his indignation, pronounced a terrible curse on everybody and every building in the town except the Goodall family and their home. The Dow legend will form one of the major themes of a pageant which will be presented in Sylvania during the Centennial Celebration. C. D. Hollingsworth, chairman of the Centennial, and other Screven County citizens, are extending a cordial invitation to people of Bulloch County to attend the four-day program which will be entertaining and instructive. Parades, addresses by well-known Georgians, band concerts, choral entertainments, and a gigantic fireworks display will be included on the program.

May 27 he applied a mixture of 50 pounds of muriate of potash and 100 pounds of nitrate of soda per acre. Three applications of calcium arsenate were applied during June and July to control boll weevils.
