WHEREAS, many citizens do not yet understand that each and every one of us has a part to play in our nurses' art to do their best work here in the control of epidemics, the early detection of remediable defects, the prevention of disease, and the adoption of good health habits, and

WHEREAS, the health of all the people is of utmost importance to happiness and progress in Bulloch county, and the public health nursing services are a highly important factor in bringing health to all the people.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, J. Gilbert Cone, Mayor of the City of Statesboro, DO HEREBY PROCLAIM April 11-17 Public Health Nursing Week, and urge everybody to cooperate fully in the observance, to the end that more of our citizens may know how to use the public health nursing services available to them, and may lend their support to expanding those services.

Dr. Lundquist added that the health department is anxious to interest girls of high school age in following a nursing career. He suggested that there is no profession for women more honored, or in which so much good can be done.

50 Future Farmers to Show Pigs; 128 Cattle to Be In Fatstock Show

The owner and shower of the home-grown champion steer in the Statesboro Fat Stock Show to be held here next Thursday will be awarded a purebred Hereford heifer by Alfred Dorman.

Mr. Dorman has given the winner of the home-grown steer class a purebred heifer the past two years. This year he is also donating a Hereford bull, to be awarded to the negro showing the champion calf.

Mr. Dorman thinks that good blood in the foundation of a herd of cattle is essential if the herd is to be any good in later years. He says he would rather give these purebred animals as prizes than to give prize money. "This way we know that good blood lines are kept in the county," he said.

More than 125 cattle are being groomed for the show. Many of the calves have been on feed since July and are made right for the showing.

FOR TWENTY-NINE HOURS

FOR TWENTY-NINE HOURS we trod the soil upon which once strolled the nation's millionaires. For a night we slept in a bed on which a tired millionaire once rested. For four meals we ate at a table where once a millionaire's family gathered to partake of their daily bread. For thirty minutes we swam in a pool where the nation's money tycoons floated.

For an hour we stretched out in a beach chair in which once an American Croesus allowed the sun to shine on him. For a few minutes we relaxed on the sofa where members of the Rockefeller family once sat to solve the major problems that plague the rich. . . .

For twenty-nine hours we were on Jekyll Island, one of the states most fascinating recreational spas.

There's NOTHING LIKE IT! There's nothing like it—an island once owned by 100 millionaires who spent—so it is said, \$2,000,000 in making it one of the world's most unique clubs. The Jekyll Island Club. And now it belongs to you and us.

During the Spanish occupation the Franciscan Mission, San Buenaventura Gualequini, was established on what the Indians called Oso Island. It was renamed by the Spaniards as San Juan de Dios. . . .

In 1734, Captain William Horton, who was sent to establish a military outpost, build a tabby house on the island. He cultivated the old Spanish fields and thousands of orange trees. It was a military reservation until 1768, when it was given as a Crown grant to Clement Martin.

About 1800, Frenchmen from Sapela Island moved to Jekyll and before long Poulain du Bignon, who remodeled the Horton house, owned the whole island. On Du Bignon Creek are the overgrown earthworks of a Confederate battery.

No effort was made to repair the havoc wrought by the War Between the States until 1886 when the island was bought from the DuBignon family by a group of wealthy men from New York, Boston and Philadelphia, who formed the Jekyll Island Club, that they might have a winter haven from the vicissitudes attached to making their millions.

You get settled and want to see the island. The main attraction is the homes of the Rockefellers, the Cranes, the Good years, the Sloanes—all palatial, with personal swimming pools, private indoor clay tennis courts,

TOCCOA, Ga., Feb. 28.—

The ground was broken here Friday for the State Farmers Market, which will serve farmers in this section of Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina. Commissioner of Agriculture, Tom Linder, told a large group of farmers and others that the market would be opened this spring, immediately upon the farmers' need. He spoke at the Toccoa school auditorium and over the local radio station.

Linder pointed out that Toccoa was located in the triangle of Chicago, New York and Atlanta and the market had a potential service to 70,000,000 within a 400-mile area. He also emphasized that this section was primarily an agricultural section despite its tremendous industrial growth in recent years.

He told the farmers to produce enough commodities to make the market successful. The market will be a concrete and steel building, 70x110 feet, with loading zones for wholesale produce. A parking area for concessions for farmers to sell produce at retail will be available.

The Bracewell Construction Co. of Toccoa has the contract for this construction work. Jones Vay, president of the Stephens County Farm Bureau, introduced Linder. R. V. Murray, president of the Toccoa Chamber of Commerce, spoke briefly and made Linder an honorary member of the trade board. Guy Jackson, assistant commissioner, along with a number of other prominent officers of the state agriculture committee were present.
