Of course, there is a law against the teen-ager under sixteen years of age driving, but that is a mere technicality which goes rejected by the parents, the teen-age driver and the city police!

A public safety expert tells us the records show that your son or daughter, still in his or her teens, is nine times as dangerous as a middle-aged driver does!

That means anything to you? You tell yourself... "My child is different. He is a good driver. He's pretty smart for his age. He's been driving a year now and he's had no accidents. That's better than most grownups can say."

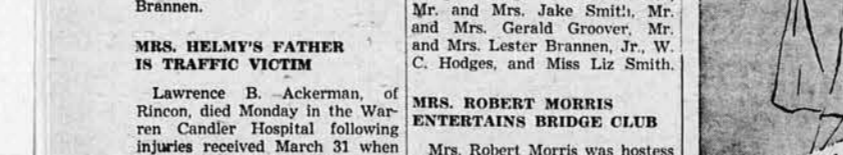

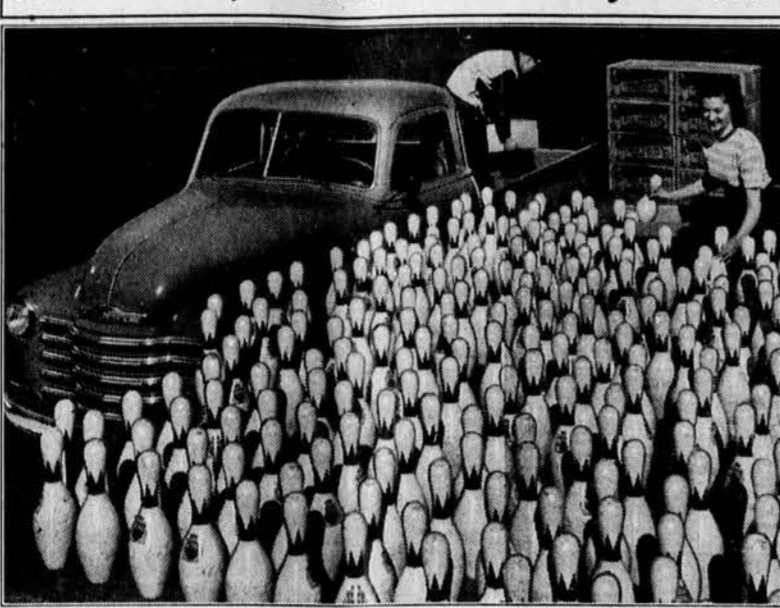
