Walton Usher In Solicitor's Race

Walton Usher, attorney at law, who lives at Guyton and maintains an office at Springfield, in Effingham county, announces his candidacy for Solicitor General of the Ogeechee Judicial Circuit, which is comprised of Effingham, Screven, Bulloch, and Jenkins counties.

Mr. Usher has begun an active campaign and says that he hopes to see as many of the voters of the circuit as possible between now and September 8th, the date of the Democratic Primary. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Usher, of Guyton; born July 6, 1910. Mr. Usher attended the public schools of Guyton and the Georgia Teachers College at Statesboro. He was admitted to the practice of law on January 1, 1932, and has been practicing continuously since that date. He has served during that time as Mayor of Guyton, and for a number of years as attorney for Effingham county.

Mr. Usher made the race for Solicitor General at the annual state meeting of the present incumbent, Fred T. Lanier. He made a fine showing at that time, carrying two of the four counties in the circuit.

WEEKLY NEWSPAPERS are prone to neglect for themselves what they so persistently advocate for others—self-promotion and advertising.

In the April 2, 1948, issue of the Congressional Record, Hon. Charles R. Robertson, of North Dakota, made a speech on behalf of weekly newspapers which we think is good, and we use it for self-promotion!

"Mr. Speaker, the United States is fortunate in having scattered throughout the country vast numbers of small weekly newspapers. They are weekly making a great contribution to the country. They are keeping the people informed and they are telling the story of American life.

"It is regrettable, indeed, that a similar condition has not prevailed throughout the countries of Europe. Had this been true, the principle that we so frequently refer to as democratic—or better still, our republican form of government, which is government of, by, and for the people—might have successfully prevailed there."

Then Congressman Robertson succeeded in inserting in the Congressional Record a statement made by Ralph W. Keller, manager of the Minnesota Editorial Association. It is as follows:

"You may put your tongue in your cheek, cross your fingers, pat yourself on the back, or just smile indulgently, while we go on record that not only must small towns stay alive, and country

newspapers prosper, but they must spread—spread to every corner of these United States, all over the North and South American Continents to the remotest hinterlands of the entire world.

"If the people of Germany, Russia, Japan, yes, even of England, and the people of every other despairing, paralyzed, cold-cramped, hunger-haunted nation on earth—if these common run-of-the-mill rural and small town workmen, business and professional people had the free radio and the free magazines and the free newspapers—media free to tell the truth as the editor sees it, free to comment on industry and politics and social life, free to help readers to unprejudiced understanding of themselves, their neighbors, and the rest of the world—if the seemingly bottomless pits of misery and ignorance into which we are pouring billions of American relief, were lighted by the torches of a free press, then could we work with confidence for world prosperity and hope with assurance for world peace.

"Compared with the great searchlights of New York, Chicago, the Twin Cities, your country newspaper may seem only a candle, but it lights a window in our American structure of literacy and know-how and free enterprise, and it's guiding someone along the pathway of personal endeavor, community progress, and world-wide brotherhood—

"Keep it blazing!"

"NUMBER 95" AGAIN

In the March 25 issue of the Herald we wrote a short front page story about "Number 95" being caught in the Ogeechee River.

"Number 95" was a shad caught by Willie Shuman at Rufus Terrell's landing. The shad had an identification button on it—placed in the fish's gills by the Bureau of Fisheries, Washington, D. C. Mr. Shuman forwarded the button to the proper authorities.

Now comes a letter from Congressman Prince Preston, enclosing a letter written to him by M. C. James, Assistant Director of the U. S. Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service. The letter gives us a clue to Mr. Shuman's "Number 95." Mr. James' letter reports that on March 23, 1948, a return was reported from the Ogeechee River near Stillson. We believe that this is "Number 95."

Here is Mr. James' letter to Congressman Preston:

April 19, 1948

My dear Mr. Preston:

At the Committee hearing on April 2 you expressed an interest in the results of some shad tagging experiments and requested that you be furnished with a record of the recoveries. I regret that my subsequent departure on a trip to the West Coast delayed the furnishing of this information. However, there follows a summary of this experiment:

Two hundred thirty-six (236) adult shad were tagged on August 28, 1947, at Mt. Desert Rock, 17 1/2 miles off the coast of Maine in the Atlantic Ocean. This experiment was conducted to determine to which streams the shad would return to spawn. This is probably the first time shad have been so farmed this far at sea.

Five returns have been made to date. These are as follows:

October 3, 1947, Atlantic Ocean, N.E. of Thatcher's Light (Mass.)

March 19, 1948, Champney River, near Darien, Georgia.

March 23, 1948, Ogeechee River, near Stillson, Georgia.

March 25-27, 1948, Pamlico Sound off Stumpy Point, North Carolina.

April 7, 1948, market return; dealer buys from Hatteras, North Carolina. Additional information has been requested.

This is exceedingly interesting in that it gives preliminary indication of wider movements of shad that had been commonly recognized. I shall be glad to keep you informed of any later developments.
