Bulloch Grows To Enter Cotton Growing Contest

Bulloch county cotton growers plan to enter the state five-acre contest much stronger in 1948 than they did in 1947, judging from entries already reported to the county agent's office. Any farmer is eligible for the contest who has five acres or more of cotton on one of the leading varieties in one field. His desire to enter must be known to county agents by June 15 and the location of the contest plot designated by July 1.

In 1947 only 14 entered the contest from Bulloch county and all three district prizes of \$250, \$150 and \$100 were won by local cotton growers. The cost of production does not enter into the contest.

The 1947 winners, W. H. Smith, L. P. Joyner, and Jim H. Strickland, have entered again. With recent perfect stands of cotton on all the acreage in the county, these winners realize they have tougher competition from their own neighbors for 1948, as well as from the other 26 counties in this district.

"Pride M. of Dwight 4th" reigns supreme over six Black Angus cattle belonging to Bish Murphy on the airport road.

We visited Bish's royalty last Saturday morning and marveled at the beauty of those black cattle—just heifers just now—that make up the base of what Bish hopes to make one of Bulloch county's finest Black Angus purebred cattle herds.

"Pride M. of Dwight 4th" is the grand champion Black Angus of Georgia, having won the title at the show of the Aberdeen Angus breeders Association in Atlanta on April 21 and 22. Bish bought the heifer at the sale from Mr. Dwight Kennedy, of Claxton.

Not satisfied with the grand champ, Bish also purchased the reserve champ, "Lovell's Pride 17th," from V. L. Lovell, of Clarksville, Ga.
The others in the royal family include "Kathleen of Dogwood 4th," bought from the Dogwood Farms, Jeffersonville, Ga.; "Lovell's Pride 18th," bought from Dr. Lovell at Clarksville; "Harris' Pride 18th," bought from Dr. Harris, Summerville, Ga.; "Black Bird Lass of Dwight 2," and "Erica Elissa of Dwight 3rd," both purchased from Mr. Kennedy at Claxton.

Bish hopes to take these heifers and build up a herd of 30 to 35 of the county's finest purebred cattle.
Right now he has not determined exactly what he wants to call his herd, but he says, "I want to use the name 'Bulloch' in it, for Bulloch county is one of the finest livestock counties in the state, and I want to make my herd proud to bear the name of 'Bulloch.'"

We were entranced with the appearance of these fine cattle. Even we could recognize the difference in these heifers and the group of "cows" across the fence which, according to Bish, were just ordinary good cows.
We want to watch the progress of this herd foundation. It means at lot now and will mean more to Bulloch county in the future.

Others in the county who have been raising purebred Black Angus cattle are Mr. "Billy" Smith, W. J. Smith, Jr., Arthur Riggs, Marlee Parrish, M. P. Martin, P. W. Clifton, A. J. and Umer Knight, and A. Lamar Jones.
And we commend Bish Murphy and the others in their ambition to improve the stock in this section. We commend all livestock growers in Bulloch who are now working to improve the breed of our cattle. It reflects on the character of our people to an advantage, as well as on the type of livestock.



tem, we do respectfully point out that preparation of teachers in our public schools is one of our supreme needs today in Georgia.

We think it is an undue emphasis on veterinary medicine for the Regents to invest more than a million dollars for a plant for Veterinary Medicine at one session of the Board while by contrast the Regents and their official predecessors have not invested an equal amount in the plant of the Georgia Teachers College during the forty years of its existence. The State's total need for veterinarians at any one time does not exceed three hundred, while its need for public school teachers is more than twenty thousand. This seems to give an unfair chance to pigs over men. It is no wonder, therefore, that good teachers are scarce.

Furthermore, we believe that the Regents, instead of reducing at this time the already too small allocation for Georgia Teachers College, should vastly increase it so that the college could retain its best faculty members, extend its facilities and its services so that it could more nearly render the service to the State which is so desperately needed at this time.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: A copy of these resolutions be filed with the Secretary of the Board of Regents, a copy to the press, Secretary of the G. E. A., Governor of Georgia, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of the State Legislature of Georgia.


