

During the time he has been there he has done much research, a great deal of studying, a lot of figuring. The results of his work were given in his talk to the Rotary Club.

According to Mr. McCormick we have here in one of the finest county-owned hospitals in this section. It's standard requirements or doctors are higher than any county hospital and higher than many large city hospitals.

He revealed that the average expenditures of the hospital over a ten-month period is \$16,500 a month-this does not include any repairs or additions. The average receipts for the same ten month period was \$16,400 a month.

Mr. McCormick pointed out that the hospital is paying out to its staff \$6,000 a month. This expense is necessary and goes on if there be one patient or if there be 75 patients in the hospital. It costs the hospital \$12.98 per patient per day. It costs that patient only \$7.50 to stay in the best room in the hospital. The \$12.98 is not out of line,

for the national iverage is \$11.00 a day. There are several saving factors to be considered, however. Mr. McCormick said that the X-Ray laboratory is one of the section's best. The

general laboratory is on the "plus side." Since the opening of the new wing at the hospital the average patients per day is 45. There

are 75 beds now available ,and at no time in the past four months were they all filled. Mr. McCormick pointed out that it is good that
