Contract Is Let to Pave 4-Lane Drive Through City of Statesboro

According to an announcement made this week, the contract for paving the U.S. 80 four-lane highway through the city of Statesboro has been awarded.

Mayor Gilbert Cone stated yesterday that the state has accepted the bid of the Bove Construction Company, of Augusta. He added that work will begin as soon as all the deeds to the right-of-way are completed. The deeds will be completed this week end, Mayor Cone said, "and work will begin in about two or three weeks."

The contract is for approximately \$409,000.00. On Friday, August 13, the Statesboro Fire Department had its first fire since April 5, when an automobile caught fire and "backed itself out of the drive to a place near a fire plug. For the same period, April 5 to August 13, 1947, there were 10 fires. Logan Hagan, fire chief, says, "Keep up the good record."

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Fair Committee Named for Bulloch A committee of 14 men, women, boys and girls was named Saturday to serve as leaders for the Bulloch County Fair this year and to formulate plans for the county's exhibit at the Southeastern Fair in Atlanta early in October. Members of the committee were selected by a group which met in the court house to make plans for these two fairs. The committee members will represent almost all organizations in the county that will be interested in promoting a fair.

Summer Grads Hear Franklin Bishop Marvin A. Franklin, pastor of the First Methodist Church, will deliver the commencement address at Georgia Teachers College at 10 a.m. Thursday, August 26. President Zach S. Henderson has announced the commencement program. Sixty-five graduates will be awarded diplomas, including eleven Bulloch countians, who make up the largest summer graduating class in the history of the college.

Warning Is Issued on Polio by Health Dept. It is thought that the increase in polio in northern South Carolina and Georgia is due, in part, to spread from the highly epidemic areas of North Carolina. The Georgia State Department of Public Health has formulated the following policy: 1. All local health departments are advised to impose a "voluntary" quarantine as follows: (a) Citizens are discouraged from traveling to North Carolina or northern South Carolina, or any area where people from these areas are likely to be; (b) all persons should submit to a voluntary two week's quarantine on their return from epidemic areas. (All North Carolina should be considered an epidemic area; spread mainly by carriers by droplet transmission emanating from the nose and throat.

11 Millions Pounds Tobacco Sold Here The Statesboro tobacco market had sold 10,963,068 pounds of tobacco through Tuesday of this week for a total of \$4,969,528.79, to average \$45.28 per hundred pounds. According to an announcement as far into the following week (the week of August 30-September 3) as necessary to sell all the late warehouses, the market here will remain open all next week and tobacco.

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



## "Facts" 1947 County Tax Levy Was 20 Mills on \$1000

This is the fifth of a series of articles written from information prepared by the Bulloch County League of Women Voters in the interest of better government in Statesboro, Bulloch County, and Georgia. This week we write on the Tax Levy for 1947.

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It was ordered that a tax levy of 20 mills on the 100 cents, or 20 dollars on the 1,000 dollars of taxable values of every kind of property as shown by the tax digest of Bulloch county, be levied for taxes for 1947, for all purposes for which taxes may be levied, except educational purposes, same to be collected by the Tax Commissioner of the county for the following purposes:

1. To pay expense of administration of county government, .0015.
2. To pay principal and interest of any debt of county; to provide sinking fund therefor, .005.
3. To build and repair public works.
4. To pay expenses of courts; maintenance and support of prisoners; to pay sheriffs and coroners.
5. To build, maintain system of county roads, .002.
6. For public health purposes; for collection, preservation of records of vital statistics, .002.
7. To pay county police, .00075.
8. To support paupers, .005.
9. To pay county agricultural and home demonstration agents, .0015.
10. To provide payment of old age assistance to aged persons in need, and for assistance to needy blind, dependent children, etc., .0015.
11. To provide for protection of forest lands, conservation of natural resources, .00025.
12. To provide medical care, other care and hospitalization of indigent and sick of county, .0005.
13. To acquire, improve, maintain airport, .0005.
14. To acquire, improve maintain public library, .001.
15. To provide for workmen's compensation, retirement or pension fund for officers and employees, .00025.
16. To provide reasonable reserve for public improvement as may be fixed by law, .02990.
17. To provide for workmen's compensation, retirement or pension fund for officers and employees, .00025.

**A Fan Looks At Ogeechee League**

Editor, The Bulloch Herald:

First, let me say I'm for the Ogeechee Baseball League 100 percent. I want to see it continue. But unless the fans throughout the league starts thinking with their brains instead of their blind rage to win a game, this league is certainly going to fold up.

Competition is a great thing in sport. Support of your home town team is admirable—up to a certain point. But when loyalty blinds one and makes ordinarily thinking citizens totally incapable of thinking, it has gone too far.

Too many people sit in the stands and think they know all the angles have never read a baseball rule book in their lives. Yet they are the ones who cause the most trouble. Then, too, managers who are supposed to encourage sportsmanship and fair play, too often say things to their players which are unfair to the officials are usually trying to cover up their own faults.

I think one of the best things ever to happen to the Ogeechee League was when the directors hired our umpire from a regular accredited umpire school. Don't let us go back to the old system under which we operated last year.

I would be willing to stake my life to the fact that not one umpire in the Ogeechee League has made one decision which in his mind was not exactly as he saw it. These boys read the rule books and devote a large amount of energy and time to becoming a fair and efficient umpire. Then for a bunch of fans who probably don't know first base from Adam comes along and give him a bad

Then a few weeks later in this same town the manager of the same team runs out and hits the umpire for calling a play exactly as he saw it.

If I were president of the league this manager would never be allowed to even see a ball game in this league.

I'm glad that the fans of Statesboro have not yet done anything for which they might be criticized. I hope they keep up the good sportsmanship.

Now, Be It Resolved that the Georgia Junior Chamber of Commerce, in executive session assembled on this 18th day of July, 1948, pledges itself to strive unceasingly to insure that the process of elections in Georgia remain a truly democratic one, by adopting the following program of action:

1. Participation in the handling of elections.
2. Posting of signs outside the polling places to remind the voter that he is engaging in a privilege rare in the modern world today—the privilege of electing his own government officials.
3. Fostering community action to maintain and preserve the secrecy of the ballot.
4. Promotion of a broader understanding, through education, of the democratic processes upon which the government of this country is based.
5. Establishment of a committee, to be called "The Election Improvement Committee," whose function it shall be to carry out the objectives of this resolution as a signed project.
