

1948 Cotton Loan

Details of the Con Credit Corporation's loan pro gram covering upland cotton produced in .1948 were released this week by Doris R. Cason, administrative officer of the Bulloch ounty Agricultural Conservation Association

Under provisions of the program, the average loan rate for seven-eighths-inch middling cot-ton, gross weight, will be 28.79 cents per pound in Bulloch coun-ty, Mr. Cason said. This averag loan rate is based on 921/2 per cent of parity on August 1. The average loan rate for fifteen - sixteenth - inch middling cotton will be 1.95 cents per ound higher, the administrativ officer said. The average rate for Bulloch county will be 31.27 cents per pound. Mr. Cason pointed out that the rate varies slightly in different areas of Georgia due to differences in freight rates to various

mill areas. Premiums and discounts grade and staple in the 1948 loa program will be calculated in relation to the loan rate on fifteen sixteenth-inch middling cotton. the administrative officer said.

Producers eligible to participate in the program, according to Mr. fason, are those producing cotton in 1948 as a landowner, landlord, tenant and charecropper. If 81,000 Roya
