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A Proclamation

Submitting a proposed amendment to the Constitution of Georgia to be voted on at the General election to be held on Tuesday, November 2, 1948, proposing to the qualified voters of the State of Georgia an amendment to Article XI, Section 1, Paragraph VI, of the Constitution of Georgia, so as to authorize Bibb County and the City of Macon to regulate the health of the county and city by and through a joint City-County Board of Health, and to ratify, validate, and confirm the original and amendatory acts of the General Assembly with respect to a joint City-County Board of Health for the City of Macon and Bibb County, including an Act of the General Assembly (Ga. Laws 1923, P. 735-738) in sections 119,

120, 121, 122, 123, 124, 125, and 126 of an Act of the General Assembly (Ga. Laws 1927, P. 1350, 1351, 1352, and 1353) and Act of the General Assembly of Georgia (Ga. Laws 1943, P. 265-266) and 124 to 124, inclusive, and regulations promulgated pursuant to the authority therein contained; to provide for the submission of the amendment for ratification by the people; and for other purposes.

By His Excellency, M. E. THOMPSON, Acting Governor, State of Georgia. WHEREAS, by the votes of two-thirds of the members elected to each of the two Houses, the General Assembly at its 1947 Session proposed an amendment to the Constitution of this State, as set forth in a Bill approved on the 28th day of March, 1947, to wit: Authorizing Bibb County and the City of Macon to regulate the health of the county and city by and through a joint City-County Board of Health, and to ratify, validate, and confirm the original and amendatory acts of the General Assembly with respect to a joint City-County Board of Health for the City of Macon and Bibb County, including an Act of the General Assembly (Ga. Laws 1923, P. 735-738) and sections 119, 120, 121, 122, 123, 124, 125, and 126 of an Act of the General Assembly (Ga. Laws 1927, P. 1350, 1351, 1352, and 1353) and an Act of the General Assembly of Georgia (Ga. Laws 1943, P. 265-266) and 124 to 124, inclusive, which acts and regulations promulgated pursuant to the authority therein contained; to provide for the submission of the amendment for ratification by the people; and for other purposes.

BE IT FURTHER ENACTED by the authority aforesaid, that the above proposed amendment shall be submitted for ratification or rejection to the electors of the State and of the area directly affected thereby at the next General Election to be held after the publication as provided for in the second section of this Act, in the several election districts of this State, at which every person shall be qualified to vote who is qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, all persons adopting the said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For ratification of amendment to Paragraph VI of Section I of Article XI of the Constitution of 1945, authorizing a Joint Board of Health for the City of Macon and County of Bibb, defining their jurisdiction, rights, powers and privileges, and for other purposes," and Sections 119-126, both inclusive, of an Act of the General Assembly of Georgia (Ga. Laws 1927, P. 1283-1287) entitled "An Act to Re-enact the Charter of the City of Macon and County of Bibb," together with the amending same, passed since 1914, with certain changes in said Acts; by which manner as returns for members of the General Assembly, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary of State to ascertain the result as to certify the result to the Governor, who shall, if such amended be ratified, make proclamation therefor.



Golf Tourney Now in Round 4

Statesboro's golfers, both men and ladies, move into the fourth round of match play today as the Second Annual Forest Heights Golf Championships are striving to enter the final rounds, which will be played in three weeks, barring bad weather.

At the present time, it is still anybody's drive, putt or chip shot that may carry him, or her, into the championship. All flights have been formed and all consolation flights have been made up through early round eliminations. At this writing, we certainly are not going out on a limb to predict the winner in either the ladies' or men's flights.

The reason we make no predictions is that some amazing golf matches have been fought out on the Forest Heights course. A. W. Stockdale, one of the early favorites, was eliminated in the very first round by Chatham Alderman, two up. That alone is sufficient proof that golf is another sport in which anything might, and does, happen. After Alderman outlasted Stockdale, he was carried to the 19th hole before finally disposing of A. M. Seligman.

Bob "Doc" West, who came in with second low medal, was made to go two extra holes before he subdued James Thayer on the 20th hole to win 1-up. After winning this struggle, "Doc" met Ike Minkovitz, and after leading him for sixteen holes lost the match to him on the 18th.

And it makes no difference whether you play left-handed or not. Inman Deble, left-hander, who was given very little chance of giving Joe Robert Tillman a hard match, was at one time 4-up on Joe and carried him to the 19th hole before losing to him. R. J. Kennedy Jr., another left-hander, was disposed of by Horace McDougald and Lennie Simmons, after Lennie had pulled an upset by defeating J. D. Watson in the first round of the second flight.

In the ladies' division only a couple of matches have been completed at this writing since their tournament started later than the men's. Only eight entered the ladies' division, but there will be plenty of fireworks in the matches before the queen is decided upon.

Although golf is still the baby in sports interest of citizens of Statesboro, it is growing fast and will not be referred to as such in the not too distant future. This tournament now in progress has already been a much greater success than the first, held last year, and it looks as though Statesboro will soon be talking golf in the same breath with football and baseball.

Korean Training Center Directed by Dr. Pittman

Dr. Marvin S. Pittman, president emeritus of Georgia Teachers College, took over his duties as director of the Teacher Training Center at Seoul National University in Seoul, Korea, at the official opening of the center August 3.

The teaching Training Center is to provide Korean teachers who are unable to go abroad an opportunity to work with American educators in learning advanced teaching techniques.

The center, sponsored jointly by a special U. S. Congressional appropriation and funds from the South Korean Interim Government, is staffed with twenty educators from the United States who will act as consultants to teachers and administrators from all provinces in South Korea.

Greeting the Korean teachers with whom he will be working until December, Dr. Pittman said: "It is our purpose to teach in a democratic way. We do not propose to force any particular method of instruction upon Korean teachers. Rather, it is our purpose to show how certain matters are handled in the United States and hope that you teachers will choose those ideas which will be helpful in your educational work."

With the facilities of the Teachers Training Center located in a part of the Seoul University buildings, Dr. Pittman comes in close contact with Dr. Chang Lee Wok, president of the university. Dr. Chang, one of Korea's distinguished educators, received an M.A. degree at Columbia University and a Ph.D. at Duquesne University, Duquesne, Iowa.

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Surprise Fire Drill Finds Schools Ready For 'Fire'

Five hundred and twenty-eight children of the Statesboro Grammar School vacated the building on College street in two minutes upon the sounding of the fire siren by Statesboro Fire Chief Logan Hagan Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock.

The nearly 300 high school students vacated the high school building in exactly one minute. The first high school students came out only 15 seconds after the siren had sounded, and the entire building was emptied in one minute.

At the Statesboro High and Industrial School the first student came from the building in 35 seconds. It is explained that they use the regular class bell instead of a siren and it takes a few more seconds for the students to distinguish the "fire warning" from the regular class bell. The building was emptied in two minutes and five seconds.

Paul Franklin Jr., chairman of the Jaycee Safety Committee, was present at the two fire drills.

Memorial Park To Be Developed

Max Lockwood, city recreation director, this week announced that the Statesboro Junior Woman's Club has adopted the beautification of Memorial Park as a club project.

A beautiful and impressive dedication ceremony. With the band, a speaker, flags, a prayer.

Let's give our war dead a LIVING MEMORIAL.

STOP WHERE A STOP SIGN SAYS STOP—There is now no excuse for accidents at street intersections in Statesboro. If there should be a crash at the main thoroughfares it will be due to the carelessness of one or both drivers.

The city has erected "STOP" signs at all the principal street intersections, making it absolutely plain which car has the right-of-way.

The "STOP" signs are of a new standard type used throughout the country. They are luminous at night and are set low enough that headlights will reflect the sign perfectly.

New type fluorescent lighting fixtures will be installed in all classrooms at an approximate cost of eight thousand dollars. The entire cost of the renovation will run well into \$60,000. This money was set aside by the regents some two years ago, but because of shortage of materials and labor, the work was only recently started.

The gym will not be completed until after the first of the year because of extensive work that is taking place. The locker rooms, laundry rooms and the dressing rooms are to be located down stairs, while the offices and classrooms will be in a new section of the gym which will extend sixteen feet toward West Hall.

PRESTON TALKS TO WEST SIDE FARM GROUP

The Republican party is known as the big business party, while the Democratic party is known as the producers' friend, Congressman Prince H. Preston told some 200 West Side farmers on Tuesday night at their regular Farm Bureau meeting.

Congressman Preston warned that the Republicans have control of both houses now and may hold this margin or even increase their strength in November. Therefore, it is more urgent than ever that farmers be well organized and ready to protect their interests, he thought.

Mr. Preston enumerated the many advantages of organized effort and recommended that farmers of the South build an organization this year such as they have never had before.

R. P. Mikell, county farm bureau president, pointed out the present trend of publicity being given the farm price support program by city papers and others, leading the public generally to think that these support programs are the direct cause of the high cost of living. He cited many instances where this publicity was wrong, and urged that farmers build a good farm bureau this year. Mr. Mikell of the various channels into which the farmer's money goes as he spends it as compared with the salaried man's spending. The farmer, because of his wide diversity of spending for many items, must be prosperous or the country would have to lower its standard of living. The general public spends its money in only a few places and a reduced income there does not affect the general economy of the nation as would the farmer's spending.

Paul Nesmith, president of the West Side chapter, asked Mrs. Hamp Smith Jr., Mrs. L. P. Joyner, Carter Deal, W.
