Without pulling punches he told the Rotarianseaders in business, professional, and agricultural activities in Statesboro and Bulloch county-that n Bulloch county 36.6 percent of the persons examined were found to have hookworms.

He explained why this is so. The hookworm parasite breeds and begins its lirty work around, in, and near open-back toilets. It is picked up by humans and finds its way into neir bodies, there to multiply and grow, sapping body strength and vitality until the affected per-

sons are incapacitated. Dr. McCroan explained that there is a treatment for hookworms-"But that is not the solution, The solution lies in sanitation. If we had 85 percent sanitation hookworms would 'hit the skids' and isappear," he said.

Then, taking figures from a survey of home sanitation and hookworm infection made in 49 counties of Georgia, he showed that Bulloch county, Where Nature Smiles and Progress Has the Right of Way," has 72 homes with no toilets at all!




