Mayor Cone Tells Rotarians About Financial Condition of Statesboro

As guest speaker at the Monday meeting of the Statesboro Rotary Club Mayor J. Gilbert Cone made a report on Statesboro's financial position and its achievements during the year.

Mayor Cone offered a \$25 reward to anyone who can reveal who named the city "Statesboro," when it was named "Statesboro," and why it was so named.

He recalled that Statesboro was originally chartered as a "town" in 1866. Then in 1889, a new charter was adopted for the city of Statesboro, and in 1912 the charter under which the city now operates was adopted.

Mayor Cone told Rotarians that the tax valuation on property in Statesboro is \$4,818,000 and that the tax rate is 19 mills. "This is well below the state average of 22 mills for cities in our class," he said.

He broke the rate down to show that 7 mills are allocated to the city schools, 4 mills for retirement of bonded indebtedness of \$241,000. He then stated that the remaining 8 mills is our general fund with which we operate all other departments of the city—police, fire, street, health, recreation, etc.

He said, "It will cost us \$102,375.30 to maintain our schools for the year 1948-49. Teachers salaries will be \$89,664, and miscellaneous expenses—insurance, fuel, etc., approximate \$14,000. Of the teachers' salaries the state pays \$64,000 with the city supplementing the balance of approximately \$25,000."

Other operating expenses of the city, totaling \$67,500, include \$24,000 for street maintenance, \$19,000 for sewage disposal, \$7,000 for the fire department, \$16,000 for the public department, and \$4,500 for street lights.

With a monthly payroll of more than \$14,000, Mayor Cone believes that the city of Statesboro is the biggest business in Statesboro.

Mayor Cone explained that the city has 1,400 water accounts which brought the city \$47,000 last year for a net profit of \$25,000 after all expenses were paid. Business licenses for 1948 brought in \$19,246, with incidental income being approximately \$5,000.

During the year the city installed two and a half miles of paving, 12,300 feet of water mains, 1,200 feet of sewage lines. "In 1949 we hope to put down one and one-quarter miles of water mains and three miles of sewer mains," he said.

"We intend to pave back streets and alleys. We have been thinking about this for one and a half years, making plans for this sort of paving. We have the money on hand to pave several now."

"We already have a meat ordinance prepared for meat inspection. We expect to put in a garbage disposal system."

Mayor Cone presented the new council member, F. C. Parker Jr., to the club.

C. M. Cowart, local secretary, stated that the county had 2,187 members in 1948 and 2,169 in 1947. Mr. Cowart stated that the county enrollment this year was the largest any county in Georgia had ever had prior to this, and that he was fairly certain that it would be the largest in the state again this year.

Mr. Mikell advised that Bulloch county was just keeping up with its previous record of increasing every year.

The next major program of the Bulloch county Farm Bureau, according to Mr. Mikell, is to fill that special train to Atlantic City on December 10. Your County forest ranger has the privilege of attending and participating in a forestry demonstration recently in Candler County. The demonstration was sponsored by the Veterans' Training Instructors, Soil Conservation Service, the U. S. Forest Service and the Ga. Department of Forestry.

The purpose of the program was to fully acquaint Bulloch and Candler county land-owners with the latest in forest management practices. The program included the marking and selective cutting of a stand of pulp wood size timber. Demonstrations and lectures were given on selective thinning, the planting of pine seedlings and fence post preservation. The construction and proper location of fire breaks was discussed. Also, an area was controlled burned. This area was infested with what is commonly known as "brown spot" disease.

I am glad to report that there has been no recent loss from wild fires in Bulloch county. Our land-owners, hunters and wood's workers are commended.

on this tour. Called the "Manequin Pia," it is a statue of a little boy who became lost and was found by his father on the corner on which the statue now stands. Erected in 1452, the statue has fifty different uniforms.

In one of the parks the Belgians have built 49 statues, each representing a trade. We also visited the National Art Gallery and the Royal Square.

Growers Urged to
Grow Own Plants.

Bulloch county tobacco growers
are urged to make it serious ef-
fort to grow their own plants for
next year.

Dr. R. J. Kennedy, president of
the Bulloch County Bank and one
of the county's oldest tobacco
growers, thinks that year in and
year out it is cheaper to grow
your own plants, in addition to
having them ready when you
want them instead of having to
face them when they are avail-
able.

Dr. Kennedy pointed out that
all too often these plants brought
in were delivered too late.

R. P. Mikell, president of the
Farm Bureau, stated that plants
shipped here during recent years
were generally inferior to plants
grown locally, the counts had in
the boxes, plants too small to be
used satisfactorily, and that if
local tobacco growers depended
on others to grow their plants
they then the price would be too
high.

E. L. Anderson, another of the
county's earliest tobacco growers,
and for several years a tobacco
demonstrator, pointed out that
growers could not tell what they
were buying unless they were
dealing with a reliable plant
grower. In many cases the plant
growers did not know the variety
they planted. He thought it the
safest bet all around to try grow-
ing all plants needed locally.

Tobacco farmers all over the
county proved last year that blue
mold could be effectively control-
led with ferimate, a foot-proof dis-
tillate that will not harm plants if
directions were not definitely fol-
lowed. Practically 100 percent
control of blue mold was procur-
ed in every instance where fer-
imate was used according to rec-
ommendations. Other sprays and
dusts also proved effective.

Weather conditions might be a
factor preventing tobacco farm-
ers from growing their own
plants, but Dr. Kennedy pointed
out that other sections of the
country also have floods, hail,
and droughts to damage their
plants.
