Growers Urged to Grow Own Plants.

Bulloch county tobacco growers are urged to make it serious effort to grow their own plants for next year.

Dr. R. J. Kennedy, president of the Bulloch County Bank and one of the county's oldest tobacco growers, thinks that year in and year out it is cheaper to grow your own plants, in addition to having them ready when you want them instead of having to face them when they are available.

Dr. Kennedy pointed out that all too often these plants brought in were delivered too late.

R. P. Mikell, president of the Farm Bureau, stated that plants shipped here during recent years were generally inferior to plants grown locally, the counts had in the boxes, plants too small to be used satisfactorily, and that if local tobacco growers depended on others to grow their plants for them the price would be too high.

E. L. Anderson, another of the county's earliest tobacco growers, and for several years a tobacco demonstrator, pointed out that growers could not tell what they were buying unless they were dealing with a reliable plant grower.

In many cases the plant growers did not know the variety they planted. He thought it the safest bet all around to try growing all plants needed locally.

Tobacco farmers all over the county proved last year that blue mold could be effectively controlled with ferimate, a foot-proof dust that will not harm plants if directions were not definitely followed.

Practically 100 percent control of blue mold was procured in every instance where ferimate was used according to recommendations. Other sprays and dusts also proved effective.

Weather conditions might be a factor preventing tobacco farmers from growing their own plants, but Dr. Kennedy pointed out that other sections of the country also have floods, hail, and droughts to damage their plants.

Home Demonstration Council Holds Annual Planning Meeting
The Bulloch County Home Demonstration Council held its annual program planning meeting at the recreation center on Friday, December 3. Home improvement will be their emphasis project for 1949.

The council voted to sponsor two countywide all-day demonstrations: a Home Improvement clinic in the spring, with special emphasis on color in the home, and the second to be a slipcover demonstration in the fall. Specialists from the Agricultural Extension Service in Athens will assist home demonstration agents in these demonstrations. In addition to these countywide programs, each club will have four demonstrations in the home improvement.

Other demonstrations to be given in local clubs are: Metal etching, plastic costume jewelry, refreshment ideas, textile painting, growing house plants, covering bolts, buttons and buckles, family counseling and family recreation.

The council voted to continue the work they had begun in 1949, with another Family Life Institute.
