Dodd Explains Local Bills to Be Introduced in General Assembly

"In an effort to explain certain inaccuracies and misunderstandings that have arisen as a result of the introduction of several local bills in this session of the legislature, and as your representative, I would like to take this method to explain the bills that are being introduced. I shall appreciate it, Mr. Editor, if you will print this matter. In the first place the other representative, Mr. A. J. Trappell, and I advertised the local bills in the official organ of the county in compliance with law. Our authority for this began when the Bulloch Superior Court Grand Jury, at the October term of court, made the following recommendation, and I quote: (We wish to thank J. L. Renfro for his able charge to this body and we recommend to our representative, Mr. A. J. Trappell, that he be appointed to the office of county solicitor by the Board of County Commissioners. (3) The clerk of the Superior Court is being placed on a salary of \$4,800 a year, to be effective on January 1, 1949. The second recommendation is to reduce the salary of the clerk of the Superior Court to \$3,600 a year, to be effective on January 1, 1949. Local PCA Makes 658 Loans In 1948

\*Credit is becoming increasingly important to farmers and farm-ers in our area in the opinion of Mr. W. H. Smith, president of Statesboro Production Credit Association.

Mr. Smith said that, according to information received from Julian H. Scarborough, president of the Production Credit Corporation of Columbia, the 94 associations in the Third Form Credit District which embraces the States of Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, and North Carolina, made 51,197 loans for \$70,573,617 during 1948. This was an increase of 5,263 loans for \$8,858,124 over the previous year. The associations added 12,554 new members which made a total of 84,555 stockholders at the close of the year.

The 30 production credit associations in Georgia have a total membership of 24,185 members and made 15,278 loans in 1948 for \$22,581,166. According to President Smith, the Statesboro Production Credit Association which serves the counties of Bulloch and Evans made 658 loans for \$1,000,000 in 1948 for \$1,000,000. The association added 108 new members which made a total of 84,555 stockholders at the close of the year.

Directors of the association are J. Harry Lee, John H. Moore, W. H. Smith, president; John H. Moore, vice president; Josh T. Nesmith, secretary - treasurer; Francis Trappell, representative secretary; and J. A. Tippins, representative with the office in Clayton.

The association assists farmers with financing of their crop production and harvesting, such as purchasing fertilizer, mules, tractors, and other farming implements, and the many other necessary expenses of farm operations.
