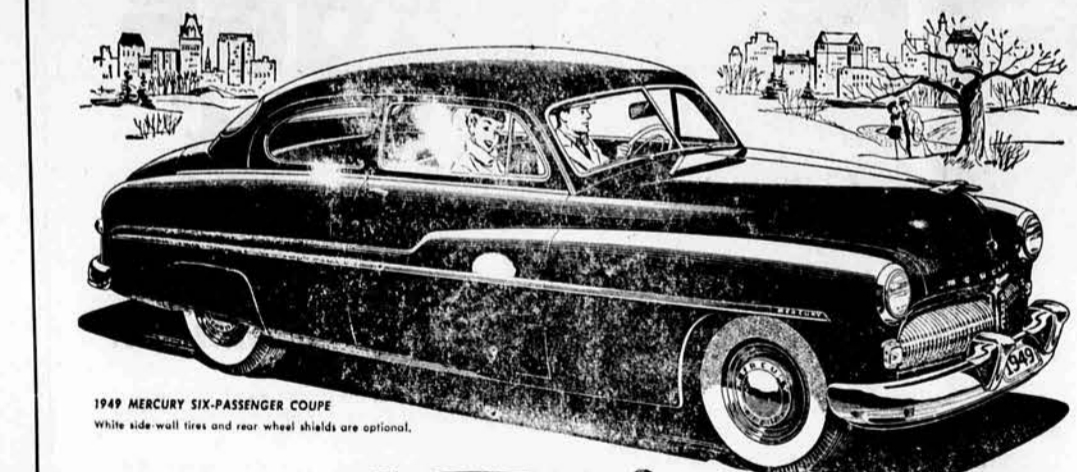

Dr. Gable To Be Here Monday

Dr. Luther Gable, noted radiologist and physicist, will be featured in the second number of the college-civic artist series to be presented in the Georgia Teachers College auditorium next Monday night.

The noted scientist was formerly head of the department of radiology and biology at the Detroit Institute of Technology. His lecture Monday night, "old idea, a tale of Marco Polo," will include facts and demonstrations of new fuel, new industries, and new methods in this Atomic Age.

Dr. Gable is the lone survivor of the first six chemical engineers to refine radium commercially in America. He made the first illuminated watch dial. In 1934 he said that he "believed the recent discovery of the world's largest and richest deposit of uranium ore on the shores of Great Bear Lake, on the edge of the Arctic Circle in Canada, will completely revolutionize industry in the next two generations." His lecture Monday will be a "look-into-the-future" thirteen years after.

Altman Opens New Show Rooms

Saturday of this week the people of Statesboro and Bulloch County are invited to the opening of the Altman Motor Company's new showroom and service shop.

Rabid Foxes Are County Menace

The Health Department has had several reports of Rabies among foxes in the past few weeks in Bulloch County, according to Dr. N. D. Lundquist, commissioner of Health.

To date no one has been bitten nor had to take the Pasteur treatment (anti-rabic vaccine), but if the infection within the fox population continues as it is likely to do, undoubtedly the health department will be called upon to supply treatment sooner or later.

"We dislike making such a proclamation," said Dr. Lundquist, "but previous experience with an epidemic of fox rabies bears out this pessimistic view point. When foxes become rabid, their actions undergo a complete reversal of form. Instead of being shy and afraid of human beings and human habitation, they become very bold. Often times a rabid fox will actually chase children or adults, or will enter the yard, even though there may be dogs on the premises. They lose all fear of man, and will attempt to bite anyone or anything in sight."

"Your County Health authorities have watched the progress of a number of cases of rabid foxes reported in surrounding counties for some time now. Counties adjoining Bulloch to the west, north and east have found it necessary to invoke extermination programs for the protection of their citizens, dogs, and livestock. Such a program includes trapping of foxes, which is far superior in effectiveness than running with hounds, and offering a bounty for each fox killed.

"Any dog owner is advised to have anti-rabic vaccine administered by the veterinarian and keep such protection up to date. Rabies among foxes is very dangerous. Adults and children will be exposed. Thousands of dollars worth of livestock can be lost. But if the dog population is unaccinated, this dread disease will spread far more serious proportions and consequences than if exposed only to foxes."

"There were some 37 of the members of the Nevils Farm Bureau that made deposits for a telephone at the meeting of that chapter Wednesday night. Gordon Hendrix, Robert Cox, and V. J. Rowe, member of the telephone committee, reported that some 30 had made deposits from the Denmark community and several from the Sinkhole section wanted service. They predicted there would be some 90 families in this county desiring telephone service in these lines.

"Those entering the corn contest from Nevils are Ray Trammel, R. L. Roberts, C. J. Martin, Rufus G. Brannen, L. C. Nesmith, and Mr. Rowe. Mr. Brannen, the community president, stated that all those desiring to enter either the cotton or corn contests would have another month to make up their minds.

Sugar Plum Tree Here March 3

Town and Country farmers will meet under the "Sugar Plum Tree" according to an arrangement made by Don Thompson and Joe Robert Tillman of the Bulloch Tractor Company.

This Mad Dog Might Have Bitten Your Child

"My child has been bitten by a mad dog!" It must be emphasized that the biting animal should never be killed if it is at all possible to confine or chain the animal for a period of at least 7 days. Killing the offending animal too soon may result in obtaining negative results from the laboratory since the virus may not be found in the animal brain until later in the disease.

Six doses of the anti-rabic vaccine arrived the next day and treatments were begun at once. Three days later, the dog died. His head was removed, packed in ice, and shipped to the State Health Department's regional laboratory at Macon for examination. Public health laboratory officials at Macon removed the brain of the dead animal, and examined sections of it under the microscope for "Negri" bodies. "Negri" bodies are bright pink masses in the brain which are only present when rabies exists.

As a further test, solutions containing tiny amounts of brain tissue were injected into the brains of white mice. Laboratory tests proved the anxious mother had been right. The dog was "mad" or had rabies. Anti-rabic vaccine was sent promptly to the local health department.

Thus, the prompt action of a physician, a public health nurse, and a health department laboratory, had probably saved a child's life. But how many more lives might be in danger? Were other
