Forestry Notes

Just because the forest lands in Bulloch county are fairly green isn't any reason that woods fires will not start or get out of control. Fires that occurred during the past week prove that fires can burn just as fast and be more destructive in late spring and summer than at any other time.

The Bulloch County unit of the Georgia Forestry Commission assisted landowners to suppress two fires last week that would have partially destroyed approximately

2,500 acres of well timbered land. It is my opinion that at least 40 per cent of the trees would have been left in such a condition that it probably would have taken them several years to overcome the burn.

Both of the fires suppressed last week were in the Leefield section of the county, on the lands of J. Harry Lee and H. U. Knight. The total area burned by both fires was only about six acres. They were reported from the Arcolia tower by Towerman R. R. Ellis.

Garden seed should be planted deeper in hot weather than in early spring.

Indications are electrically heated potato beds are profitable. Robert Cox told his fellow Farm Bureau members at Nevils Wednesday night.

Mr. Cox stated that their bed was six by 30 feet and was heated with two 120 foot cables that was now producing plants for around 50 cents per 1,000. The two cables, thermostat and other equipment needed for such a potato bed cost him some \$50, but most of this equipment would last for a long time.

Mr. Cox reported pulling draws from the bed in some four weeks from the date of bedding, but though they could be expected to produce plants in three weeks. He stated that Carl Her's bed under similar conditions was producing plants for some 30 cents per 1,000. Mr. Her's did not do so well with his bed in 1948 because of the water leaking through his cover. One of Mr. Her's neighbors pulled plants in 17 days after the potatoes were bedded.
