New Swimming Pool To Open June 1; Dedication At 2:30 P.M.

Work will begin on construction of the new annex to the Statesboro High School sometime next week. Monday afternoon of this week members of the high school board of education, together with the architect and contractors, met in the city office to sign the contract for the work.

At the opening of bids last Thursday at noon at the high school, the contract for construction was awarded to Cote Somers, of Vidalia, Ga., whose bid of \$76,826 was the lowest of the 12 submitted. Mr. Somers built the Statesboro Presbyterian Church and the Forest Heights Country Club. The water will be from three feet deep to nine feet deep, with four ladders along the sidewalks. The immense filters will change a water completely every eight hours.

A brief dedication ceremony will open the pool next Wednesday afternoon at 2:30. Mayor Gilbert Cone will make the dedication and receive the keys from the city engineer, James Bland. A swimming and diving exhibition is scheduled for the opening. Every citizen in the county is invited to attend. It's your pool. Enjoy it!

A large concrete terrace between the pool and the bathroom is 64 by 24 feet. H.P. Womack On Rotary Program H. P. Womack, county school superintendent, was guest speaker at the Statesboro Rotary Club on Monday of this week.

He revealed that in Bulloch there are 17 "GI" teachers in the county whose salaries range up to \$3,200 a year, with a travel allowance of \$600. He stated that each of these teachers handle between 20 and 25 boys. Their salaries are paid by the federal government.

In contrast he stated that the average teacher in the county is receiving between \$1,200 and \$1,440 a year with no travel allowance, and no "assurance that that amount is fixed."

He pointed out that this difference creates an "unrest in the average teacher."

and Cobb were praised; and Brown was roundly damned in nearby every fraternity house, literary society, dormitory room, and in the streets. Life on the campus became unbearable for Julius L. Brown, son of the ex-governor, until in the end tolerance asserted itself and permitted him to remain.

When General John Pope, Federal military commander in Georgia, heard about the oration, he placed the University under the axe of his broad and dictatorial powers. It seemed that the Cox oration plus the cooperation between Ben Hill and the students in opposition to the Reconstruction measures would cause the closing of the institution for an indefinite time. But Ben Hill, as was often the case, came to the rescue again. This time Hill went to Washington and persuaded General Grant to allow Georgia to remain open. After all, Albert Cox had given merely his own personal opinion. It would be indeed unbecoming of even a bad commander to deny the opposition freedom of speech and to close a state university because the students and people of the state and school disagreed with him and his subordinates. So the University of Georgia continued, graduating Henry Grady the following year and thousands of other fine Georgians since.

The Cox oration and subsequent events caused by it are but a few of the many interesting happenings of old times at the University of Georgia. One may recall about them with enjoyment in "College Life in the Old South" by Dr. E. Merton Coulter of the present Georgia faculty. Dr. Coulter is a foremost authority on Georgia history and the author of a number of outstanding works on Georgia and Southern history. As another commencement season comes and passes, the thoughts of many will

no doubt turn to these old placecards of early education in the red ole hills. Days when Georgia Greats such as Crawford Long, Alex Stephens, John B. Gordon, Thomas R. R. Cobb, Bob Toombs, Henry Grady, Albert Cox, and others trod familiar campus trails that still receive the prints of eager feet; witness the glances of ambitious eyes, and the hopes of determined hearts.

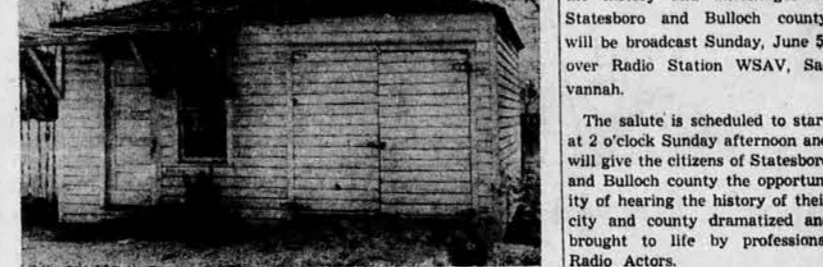
