Cans of Food Stuff

Five thousand, three hundred and thirty-nine cans of fruits and vegetables preserved since May 17. No, this isn't in preparation for an especially lean winter, nor are the canners planning to feed the starving Europeans. Thrifty families of Register community are just following their customary procedure of preserving their summer garden produce in the Register canning plant.

In the nine weeks since the plant has been in operation this season, 84 families have used its facilities. Such products as tomatoes, corn, beans, peas, and soup have been put up for use during the cold months.

The canning plant's four steam-jacketed kettles, three power-electric sealers, and other modern equipment are capable of canning approximately 2,000 cans in a half-day.

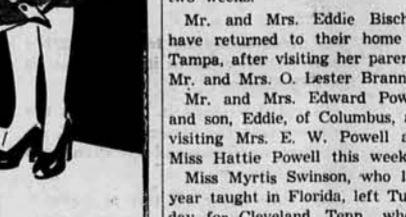

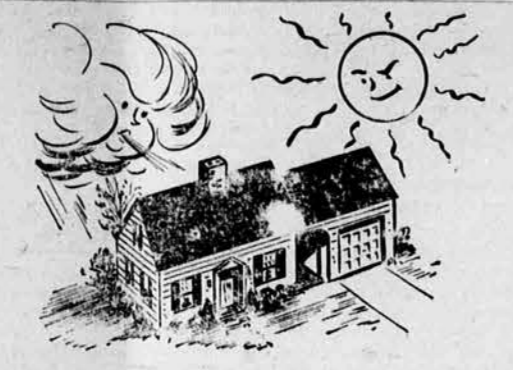

but when I asked how the animals were killed, the reply was: "We stick the hogs; the cows are knosed in the heads!"

Feeling a bit weak, I realized that death at the plant is the same as death on the farm. But replacing the barrel of hot water is a de-hairer; but it leaves any hair a blowtorch leaves the carcass pear-toned and hairless. There were choppers, grinders, and mixers. There were men and women who prepared cuts of meat.

I was allowed a peep into the processing house, where the curing was done with butane gas, and smoke from hickory sawdust gave the flavor of remembered hickory-cooked hams. There was a Jordan cooler, and showers for cooling swiners; and accepting the cleanliness of the plant, I saw men and women enjoying their midday lunch just inches away from their duty. And, as for me, I came away simply drooling for some of those pork sausage. The ones in my refrigerator were smoked.

MY NEXT VISIT was prompted by a window display of photographs. One was a wedding album. Here I was greeted by Henry Clifton, the photographer. Further conversation revealed that he is another Bulloch county boy who has made good, but who comes home to live happily in the old hometown. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Remer Clifton. He is a graduate of Brooklet High School and attended the University of Georgia, where he became interested in photography. Personally, I believe that while on the farm he soaked in the beauty of dew on a watermelon at sunrise. Or, perhaps, his creative ability came to light under the stimulus of evening shadows on a sandy field. Anyway, Henry is an artist with a camera.

At Williamsport, Pa., where he had a studio for six years, he did movie sequences of parties, weddings, and football teams. He moves from the formal to the candid type photography. He catches the sentiment at weddings, has infinite patience with babies, likes to help you keep green the memory of anniversaries, etc.

I trailed him through the mystic maze of reception room, powder room, studio (with a Hollywood-like barrage of lights), and through the day workroom, washing room and drying room. We're still talking about pictures.

On emerging from this enlightening trip, I met the wife, Florence Clifton, and their daughters, Rochelle and Charlotte. And, waiting in the reception room, I saw Minora Zetterover with marvelous proofs of her daughter, Betty, a bride-elect of August.

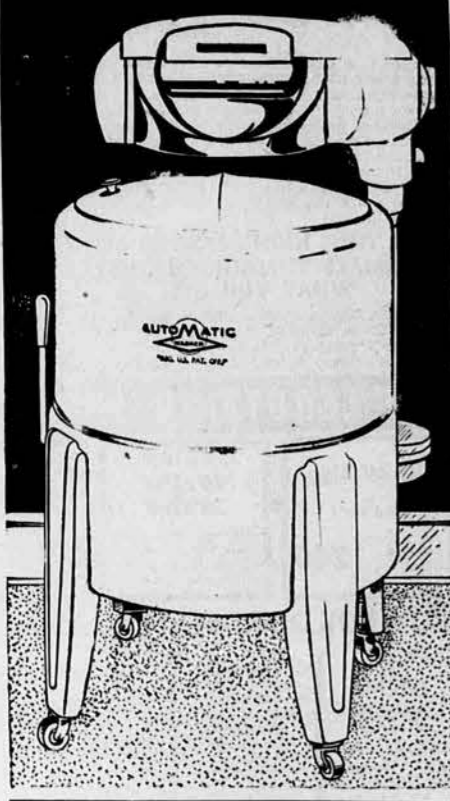

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July Grand Jury Recesses Monday; To Continue Deliberations August 8

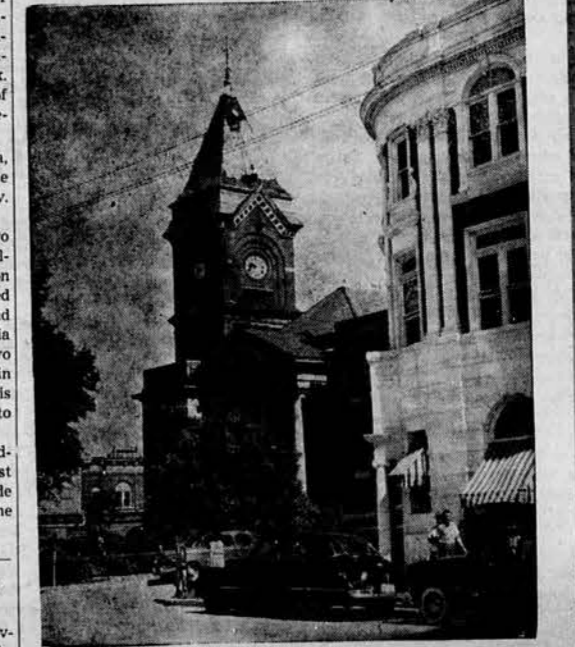
