New Statesboro-Atlanta Route Is Now 202 Miles

Car owners who travel between Statesboro and Atlanta at frequent intervals will be interested in the publicity being sent out this week promoting a new short route between the two cities.

The route, as yet unnamed, cuts the distance from Atlanta to Statesboro to 202 miles. Leaving Statesboro the driver follows U.S. 80 to Swainsboro, passing through the downtown section and taking a right turn from 80 on State Route 57 at the Swainsboro school. This state route passes the Swainsboro baseball field.

Following 57 through Kite, the motorist arrives at Wrightsville and turns right into State Route 15, which he follows to Tennille. At Tennille he turns left on State Route 68 and follows it to State Route 24, which takes him into Milledgeville.

He passes through Milledgeville and joins U. S. 441, the "Uncle Remus" highway, which he follows to Atlanta, where a left turn puts him on State Route 16, which he follows to a small town, Willard. At Willard the driver turns right into State Route 142, through Shady Dale, and runs into State Route 12, four miles east of Covington.

Following highway 12, the motorist passes through Covington, Conyers, Avondale, and into Decatur and Atlanta.

This new route is paved all the way, is relatively free of heavy traffic, and passes through some of the most historical and beautiful spots in Georgia. It sounds complicated to follow but, in reality, is very simple.

If you are planning a trip to Atlanta, and would like to follow this route, get a map of Georgia. Follow the directions given above

and outline your trip. This route follows almost a straight line from Statesboro to our state capital. Much of the paving is new, one stretch having just been completed from Covington to Willard, another from outside Eatonton to Milledgeville and the "Bee Line" route from Swainsboro to Wrightsville.

Coming from Atlanta, southward, the driver follows Ponce de Leon avenue out to Decatur and Avondale. At Avondale he turns right on State Route 12 and follows it to the intersection of 142, four miles east of Covington. He then follows the route as given above, except in reverse.

FARM BUREAU

DENMARK, MIDDLEGROUND, IVANHOE CHAPTERS MEET

DDT and sulphur is the dust being most generally used in the Denmark, Middleground and Ivanhoe communities to control bean caterpillars.

This pest is becoming an annual problem, judging from the discussion in these farm bureau meetings. Most peanut growers were using some 25 pounds of 2.5 percent DDT and sulphur mixture and obtaining good results. However, several reported they found a 5 percent DDT mixture was giving better results, and that a 5 percent DDT emulsion was still giving a quicker kill.

The generally high price support program announced for peanuts this year met with favorable reaction when discussed at these meetings. Most growers thought the support program would be lower than last year, even though the crop had been more expensive. With only \$6 to \$8 per ton reduction announced they think prospects for a crop would offset the money loss.

Middleground served a barbecue supper, while Denmark and Ivanhoe went in for picnic lunches. A comedy motion picture was a part of the program at all three meetings.

Committees were named to check on the corn contest demonstrations in the various communities. Cards had been placed in the hands of all contestants for making stalk and ear counts, but the committees are to make a check behind these counts on all of the higher yields.

any age. Besides, paralysis occurs in only a small fraction of the total number of cases, and about 80 percent of polio cases reported recover without any permanent crippling effects.

"Polio is caused by a virus—a disease-producing organism—so tiny that it cannot be seen through an ordinary microscope. Paralysis can occur when the virus injures or destroys certain nerve cells in the spinal cord which control muscular action.

"The disease may occur at any time of the year, but it strikes most frequently in summer. Polio outbreaks or epidemics usually reach their peak in late August or early September.

"Early symptoms of polio include headache, slight fever, upset stomach, or those symptoms common associated with a cold or several other contagious diseases. At the slightest suspicion of polio, the doctor should be called at once. While waiting for the doctor, the sick person should be put in a room by himself and kept as quiet and as comfortable as possible.

"While we still have a lot to learn about polio, there are certain precautions that can and should be taken against the disease, particularly when there is an outbreak in the community.

"Children and adults should stay away from crowds at this time, and away from anyone who appears to have even the slightest illness. It is believed that the polio virus is spread from person to person. It is wise to avoid playgrounds.

"Parents have reason to dread infantile paralysis, or polio—little. Besides the possibility of death, they fear that the child who gets polio might be permanently crippled. Some also feel helpless against the disease because there is still no preventive or cure for it, and the exact method of its transmission is still not known.

"But we do know that prompt treatment under medical advice may prevent even temporary crippling, or decrease the seriousness of permanent crippling, which is sometimes a complication of polio. If the disease causes temporary paralysis, it is still often possible to avoid permanent crippling through one of the newer methods of treatment.

"The disease's popular name, 'infantile paralysis,' can be misleading. Although many cases—approximately 60 percent—reported are in children under ten years, polio can attack people at

any epidemic as an extra precaution. "Parents are wise to seek full information on polio. This can be obtained from their family doctor, Bulloch County Health Department, their local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, or the office at 120 Broadway, New York 5, N. Y."

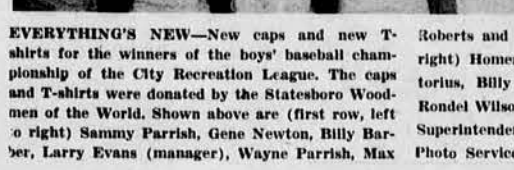
