The name of the Princess is Eugenia Ruspoli, and there seems to be no question about the clarit of her title to the property. But she says those sixteen families have resisted every effort to mov them out.

There they are, and there they intend to stay, until the Italian government does something about providing them with homes. The men work in the fields, while their women raise chickens in the castle, cook on coal and wood stoves and try to bring up families, inte which, of course, children have been born during these five year






