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FARM NEWS

Robert Cox was named president of the Nevils Farm Bureau for next year at the regular meeting Wednesday night. Mr. Cox has been a member of the Farm Bureau for some 10 years and during that time has attended most of the state conventions and all district and local conventions. He has served his local chapter in the capacity as vice president and as secretary. He knows what Farm Bureau stands for and how it operates. He succeeds Rufus G. Brannen. J. K. Williams was elected vice president to succeed Mr. Cox and Walton Nesmith was named secretary to replace D. B. Edmunds. Devaughan Roberts was given the Purina trophy for having won the fat stock show championships. A. C. Bradley and J. W. Cone made the presentation at the Farm Bureau meeting. R. P. Mitchell, county president, reported that Nevils had turned in 143 members to date. Mr. Brannen was stated that they would have 160 by next week. There were 25 new members signed up at a called meeting at Esala Wednesday night. This group had formerly been members at Pembroke, but wanted to organize a chapter of their own. Carl Iler and W. E. Cannedy predicted there would be some 50 members in the new organization. Mr. Iler was named temporary chairman with the understanding that they would meet again third Tuesday night in November and perfect an organization. The group served ice cream and cake but planned for a oyster supper at their next meeting. The Register group reported about 100 members renewed and planned to elect officers at their November meeting. 
Following a short talk on AAA payments by G. E. Gay, several tractors were auctioned off to help the third grade put shades over the windows in their room. Mr. Mitchell reported that some 25 members of the Farm Bureau had made reservations for the state convention to be held in Atlanta November 7 to 9. GROWING SUMMER FERTILIZER NOT NEW through the winter months is not new in Bulloch county. This business of planting winter cover crops, summer legumes for grazing, and carrying on soil building and maintenance work started over many years ago here. However, the present day methods perhaps gained its most attention following the appearance of the boll weevil. It is true that more winter legumes will be planted this year than ever, especially blue lupine. However, the local farmers turned to winter legumes and peanuts for hogs immediately following the first world war. The boll weevil eliminated Sea Island cotton and hurt the short cotton materially. Something had to be done. The cotton growers started raising hogs and cows, planted a little tobacco, and lots of peanuts for grazing and a few peanuts for harvest. In the early thirties Austrian winter peas, the vetches, John H. Brown, and Delmas Rushing, through these some 30 years of practice by good farmers in the county. J. A. Bunch, Paul Groover, Henry Blitch, J. E. Hodges, and many other livestock-minded farmers had also learned the need for putting some of this land in grazing lands, a practice that is being adopted more and more in the county. Thousands of acres will be put to soil building crops this winter based on the results obtained through these some 30 years of practice by good farmers in the county.

ALL'S FAIR





Treating the proposed tobacco plant bed site with Cyanamid now will prevent weeds in the bed next spring. One pound of the chemical per square yard applied some 60 to 80 days prior to seeding the bed will go a long way toward preventing the usual weed problem.

Generally the tobacco bed is prepared as if it was to be planted in October and then about three-fourths of a pound of Cyanamid per acre is worked thoroughly into the top five or six inches of the soil.

VD-TB Survey Coming to Bulloch Two Weeks, November 16 Through 29

The famed VD-TB survey is coming to Bulloch county for two weeks, November 16 through 29, it was announced yesterday by Dr. W. D. Lundquist, Commissioner of Health.

Dr. Lundquist said the purpose of the program is to give every citizen of Bulloch county, 12 years of age and over, a free blood test for syphilis and x-ray for tuberculosis.

"We have set an age limit," the doctor said, "because the x-ray machines are designed for adults, and the picture of a small child's chest does not show up well.

"The doctor explained that the test is a simple one and that the procedure for their children, we urge them to come to the Health Department after the survey had been completed. We will then give them a skin test."

The age limit of 12 years does not pertain to Negro children, Dr. Lundquist emphasized, as far as the blood test is concerned. "The Georgia Health Department" has found so much congenital syphilis among the Negroes that we are anxious to give even the very young a blood test to see if they are infected with the "venereal" syphilis differs from the ordinary disease in that it is passed from the mother to the child during pregnancy.

Veterans Should Reinstate N.S.L.I.

Georgia veterans who have service-connected disabilities of less than 100 per cent and have allowed their National Service Life Insurance to lapse should reinstate their insurance before January 1st, 1950, William K. Barrett, director of the State Department of Veterans Service announced today. According to Mr. Barrett, veterans with service-connected disabilities will not be able, under existing laws, to renew their NSLI after January 1st.

Under the deadline, veterans with less than total service-connected disabilities may apply for and receive National Service Life Insurance even though their injuries are such that private insurance companies would refuse to insure them, Mr. Barrett stated. He added that all disabled veterans must undergo a physical examination before the insurance is issued but that this examination will be made by the Veterans Administration and without any charge to the applicant.

Disabilities must have been acquired in active service between October 8, 1940, and September 2, 1945, in order for the veteran to be eligible for the waiver, it was announced.

Partially disabled veterans who have less than \$10,000 in National Service Life Insurance in effect at the present time should increase the amount before January 1, according to Director Barrett. Under the deadline, the amount of insurance may be increased to the maximum (\$10,000) but not after that time, under existing laws.

In the announcement Mr. Barrett urged all disabled veterans who have allowed their National Service Life Insurance to lapse, or who do not have the full amount at the present time, to immediately contact the Veterans Service Office in their locality before January 1 for further information and to reinstate the insurance.
