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Don't Be Half Sure . . .

SURE WE know that you do not have a venereal disease. And sure we know you do not have tuberculosis. Or are we sure? Are you sure you do not? Last year 52 people in Bulloch county were reported by public health clinics or private physicians to have syphilis. These were the known cases.

Health authorities believe there are more than 500 undiscovered cases of venereal diseases in Bulloch county this year . . . and a lot of those who have it are not aware of it . . . as VD. And now comes the opportunity of being sure.

And the opportunity for treatment with complete cure resulting. Yesterday the Bulloch County Health Department, in cooperation with the U.S. Public Health Service, began a county-wide search for cases of tuberculosis and venereal diseases.

It is expected that 16,500 citizens of the county will report for testing for these two diseases. Testing stations have been set up all over the county in convenient locations. Buses will operate in areas to pick up persons to take them to the nearest station.

Many College Vets Owe Government As Result of Subsistence Overpayment

Thousands of Georgia veterans who owe the government money as a result of overpayments of subsistence allowance or other benefits or defaults on GI loans may find deductions made from their National Service Life Insurance dividends, the Veterans Administration has disclosed.

All or part of their share of the forthcoming dividend may be needed to cover their debts to the government, according to Vaux Owen, VA's Georgia Regional Manager.

All of the individuals concerned are aware of their indebtedness to the government and know that it is deductible from other VA payments to which they may be entitled, Mr. Owen pointed out.

Most of these debts were incurred as the result of overpayments on subsistence allowance to veterans taking education or training under the GI Bill. Overpayments result when the veteran or his school or training establishment fails to notify the VA that training has been interrupted. In thousands of cases, veterans continued to receive and cash subsistence checks to which they were not entitled.

Other types of indebtedness are overpayments on pension, compen-

sation, or readjustment allowances and losses made good to lenders on defaulted GI loans. Many veterans are now repaying indebtedness by having deductions made in monthly benefit checks.

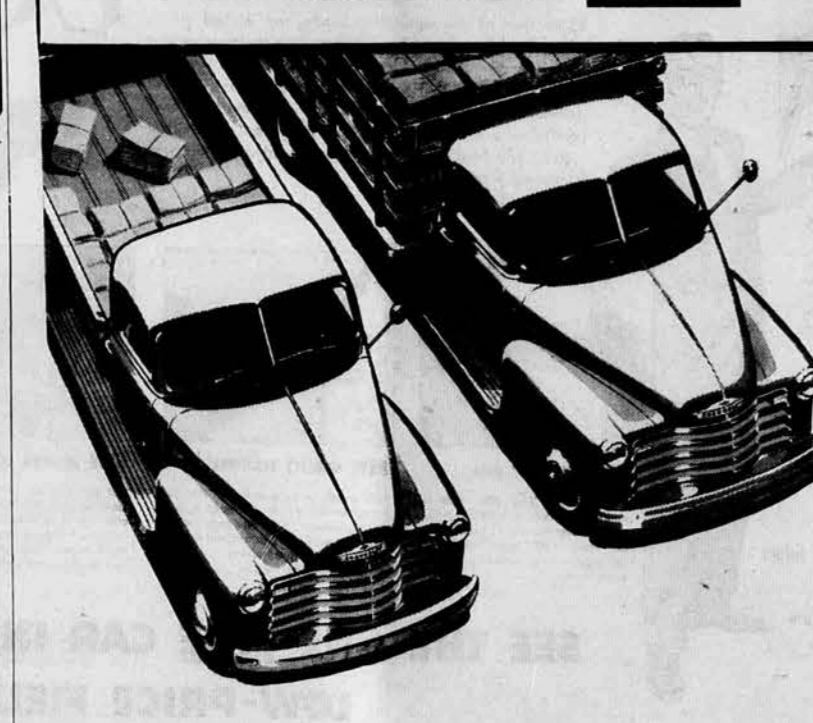
