you were—convinced of its quality by the word and reputation of your butcher. And at breakfast this morning your houghts were not bothered with worries of what pieces of meat went into the grinding of your delicious sausages. The confidence you have in the meat market from which the sausages came eliminated such worry.

And the roast that you will eat at lunch today or tomorrow will be tender and tasty. And there's no time lost in won-dering of the course of events which
