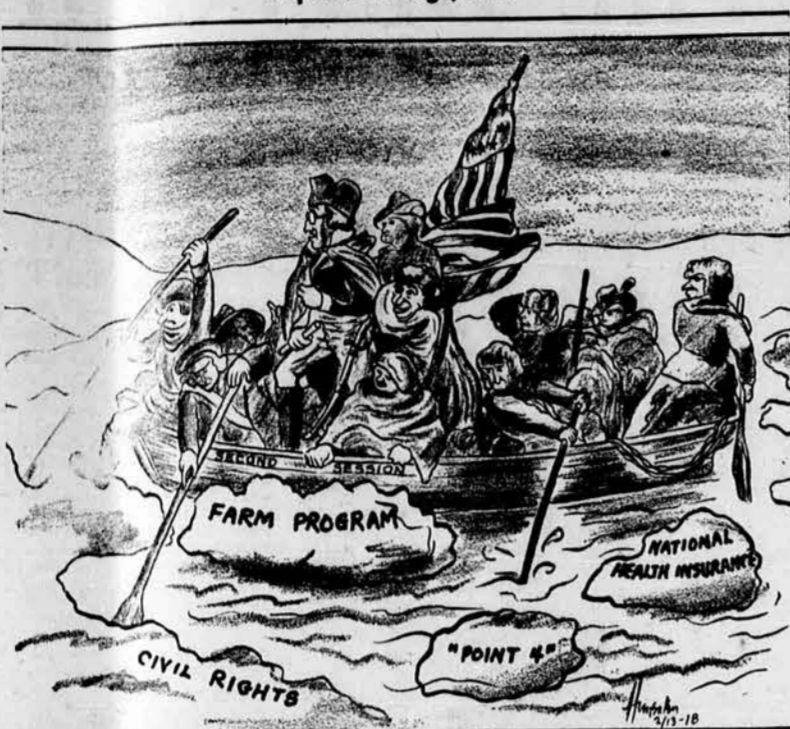
Remember the Wonder...
