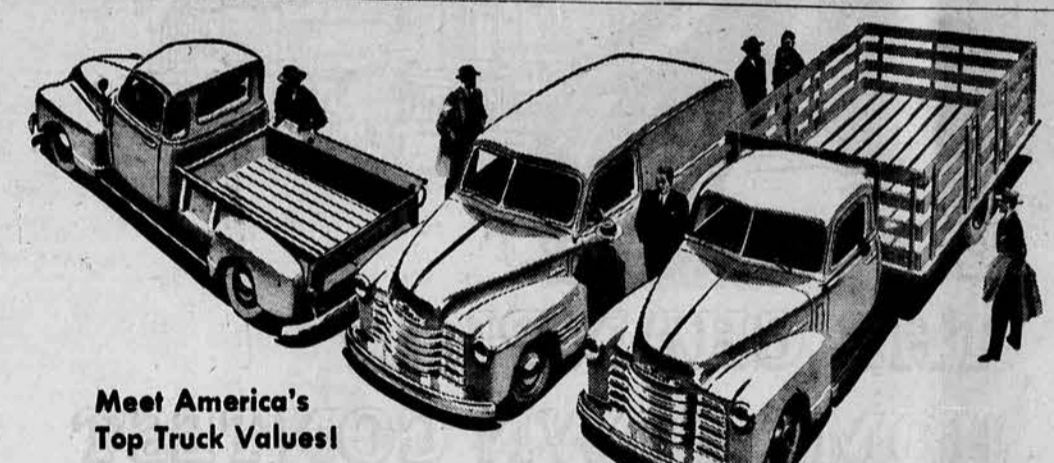

Skipper was purchased by J. G. Fletcher as a young male pig from Lyle Stokes, Conway, Iowa. Mr. Stokes is widely known in the hog show circles in the Corn Belt for his deep, thick and tippy Spotted Poland China hogs.

The 15 bred gilts being offered Wednesday afternoon are all bred to Southern Victory, bred by Cecil Wilson, Lenox, Iowa. This sire is from the Advancer and Gold Lad blood lines. The dams of the hogs to be sold are all sired by Conquest Jr., a sire bought by Mr. Fletcher from Charles Gorrell, Caladonia, Ill. His is from the Mischief Maker blood lines. In addition to the 15 bred gilts Mr. Fletcher is selling at auction he is also offering 10 fall gilts and 10 fall male pigs from these same blood lines.

The blood lines used by Mr. Fletcher are good enough to cause the former farm superintendent at the State Prison, Ernest F. Fletcher, since resigning his position at Reidsville, Mr. Pace is now breeding hogs at Eastman and he is using these same blood lines on his own herd. Mr. Pace breeds his own hogs from Mr. Fletcher when he was swine specialist for the Extension Service. At that time he had the chance of inspecting all the Spotted Poland China herds in Georgia and found that Mr. Fletcher's hogs were as good as he could find any place.

Soil Conservation Crops  
Excellent crops for soil conservation and improvement in the mountain section of the state are kudzu, lespedeza sericea, alfalfa, and to a limited extent, red clover. These crops work in three ways. They hold soil on steep slopes, add nitrogen and organic matter and reduce leaching.

Kills Johnson Grass  
Sodium TCA, according to Extension Service agronomists, will kill Johnson grass, Bermuda grass, quack and other perennial grasses. At low application rates, it will control crab grass, foxtail and cheat. Recent reports show it will control prickly pear cactus and palmetto.

Weed Killer Announced  
Ammate, which is ammonium sulfamate, is unexcelled for control of poison ivy and poison oak. It is also used to kill trees. Ammate disintegrates quickly in the soil and eventually becomes a nitrogenous fertilizer.

The Experiment Station at Tifton recommends that 65 pounds of shell peanut seed be planted per acre.  
Agronomists recommend that Georgia farmers who grow crimson clover for seed use 10 pounds of borax per acre.
