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Fifty-Five Students

The fifty-five students in the Register High school in the school year... The day finds some student... looking up some information... to select one of the many current magazines there to read.

Mrs. Chas. A. Cates, English teacher of the 8th, 9th, and 11th grades has made a survey of the reading done outside of class time. The students completed this information recently and found that the 55 students in these 3 classes had read a total of 845 books this school term. That shows an average of about 15 books per pupil that have been reading solely for enjoyment.

Reading tests show that these students who are doing a lot of outside reading have improved as much as ten and twelve years in their reading levels. Students feel that they have learned to "read for the joy of reading."

In the eighth grade Hudson Temple is leading his class with a total of 25 books read. Jack Quick is second with 20 books read. In the ninth grade Loretta Tucker is far in the lead with 74 books read. Annette Crumley follows her with 64. In the 11th grade Eugene Waters has read 14 books. Betty White is second with 13. All material read by students was approved material with thought given to the individual student's reading level.

The grammar school students are also frequent visitors to the library. They average reading 4 to 6 books per pupil per month. Many new books have been added to the Register library this year. A professional shelf has been added for the teacher's use, and a small collection of adult fiction has been added for the community's use.

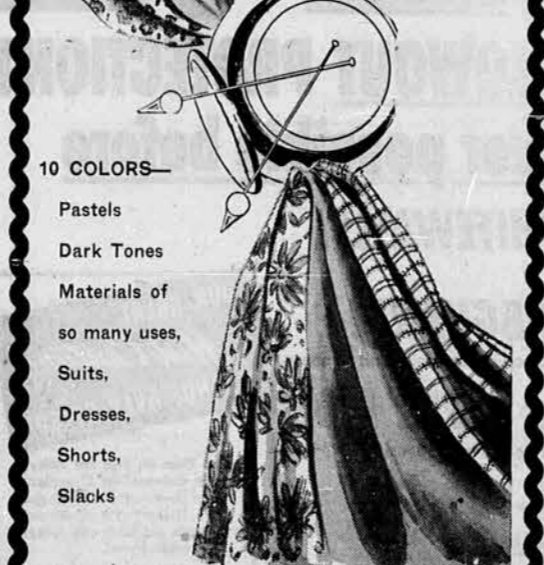

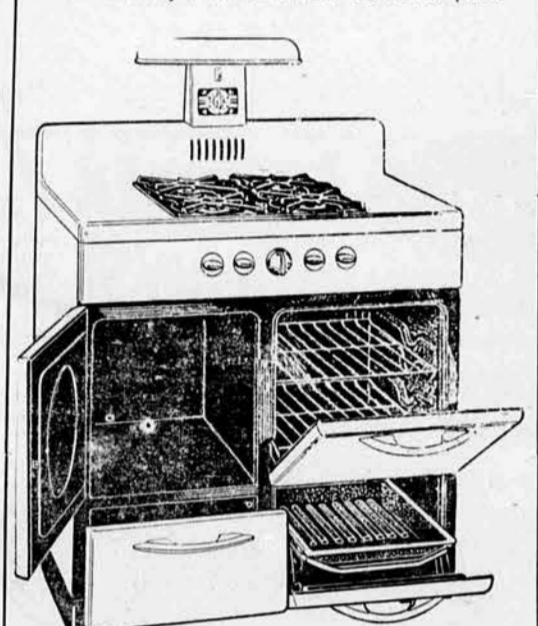
